Saint Patrick

As March 17 approaches it is appropriate that we learn a little more about "The Apostle of Ireland," St. Patrick. It seems that his exact years of birth and death are in dispute, but they were about 386 -- 461 A.D.

St. Patrick, during his childhood, in Southwestern Britain during a troubled time in history when the Romans were abandoning the island. At sixteen years of age he was carried off by Irish Marauders and sold as a slave in Ireland where he passed his captivity as a herdsman. He saw visions in which he was encouraged to escape and finally after six years he made good with his escape to Gaul. There he became a Monk. St. Patrick began having visions of the Irish calling him back so he decided that this was to be his mission. He returned fourteen years later to help convert Ulster, Ireland to Christianity. As a result many legends grew up about him, such as the shamrock as a symbol of the trinity. It was rumored that there was no night for twelve days after his death in 461.

There is no doubt that this great missionary made a lasting mark in Ireland's history and upon the Irish every where. He brought the Roman alphabet to Ireland. he gave Ireland her national symbol, the shamrock, and perhaps the greatest gift St. Patrick gave to Ireland was Christianity.
