475 Votes Cast In Local Election

A total of 475 Voters turned out for Tuesday's Local Village Election despite the miserable snowy weather and slippery streets, with Republican Candidates making a clean sweep of the election.

Mayor Paul F. Kilbane, unopposed, received 387 votes.

James F. Mulholland received 351 votes for Trustee.

Charles S. Ruger was low man on the ticket with 259 votes to succeed himself.

On the Democrat slate, for Trustee, Carl E. Atwell made a good showing with 184 votes; with Mes (Aquinus) McCormick receiving 118 votes in her first bid.

The campaign itself was a rather quiet one with both parties doing some advertising and the Republicans sending out a letter over the week-end.

In analyzing the vote, it appears as if the voters are still of the opinion that the candidates are still opposing each other the way the names appear on the ballot — instead of voting for any 2 candidates, which is the actual case. This idea is borne out by the fact that in adding up the total vote of Charles Ruger and Carl Atwell who appeared opposite each other on the ballot, the total comes to 463 votes. Likewise, in adding the total of the other two candidates, we find a total of 469 votes — with only a difference of 6 votes between the two totals.

120-Day Delay Entry Program

Because Army training centers are booming along at full capacity, the Army has initiated a 120-day delay entry program according to Sgt. Buchler, local area recruiter. With the aid of this program, the Army hopes to be able to forecast how many troops will arrive for training each week.

Under this program, men enlist in the service while still in school or while working at a job, but do not go on active duty for anywhere between 60 and 120 days. During this "waiting period", however, enlistees build up time toward pay and promotions and serve in an active reserve capacity.

Under this same program, men wishing to enlist in a particular field or school may now enlist for a particular course which will not begin for several weeks or months or for one which is filled now, but has openings in a later class. This way they can assure themselves of a place in the field of their choice.
