New York State "Going To The Dogs"

New York's steadily climbing upstate dog population was counted at 228,762 last year, reports the Dog Licensing Bureau of the Department of Agriculture and Markets.

The 1966 tally was 69,100 at those dogs daily seen with their owners' names and addresses recorded on a master identification list at Albany. The list is used approximately 1,000 times yearly to return lost dogs to their owners.

Some of the 23,600 unlicensed dogs were too young for licensing. Others are kept entirely on the owner's property. And the rest seem to have been overlooked by the local enforcement authorities.

Dog licensing fees upstate ran from \$4 to \$2,205 last year. Like it said this was a new high. At but 10 per cent of the fees is retained locally.

Anti-Blaze Tomatoes Best Choice For Gardens

A Cornell University horticulturist suggests that when choosing tomato seeds and plants for the garden, disease-resistant varieties be selected whenever available.

Prof. Philip A. Minges, vegetable crops dept., N. Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell, said Verticillium Wilt is frequently a problem where tomatoes are planted in the same soil each year.

A new tomato variety named New Yorker has been developed at the N. Y. State Agricultural Experiment Station at Geneva. Resistant to Verticillium Wilt, it is an early-ripening variety, slightly earlier than Fireball. However, fruit size often is slightly smaller.

Also, a Verticillium-resistant Fireball has been developed. Minges said persons partial to this early tomato, but experiencing a disease problem, should buy the resistant type.

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ATTENTION DOG OWNERS

A NIGHT QUARANTINE for dogs is in force in this county. It was laid at the request of the county board of supervisors to help protect livestock from dog damage.

Dogs must be securely confined between sunset and one hour after sunrise. Any peace officer shall kill on sight any dog at large in violation of such order. A dog shall not be deemed to be at large if accompanied by and under the full control of the owner.

Any owner of a dog who shall neglect to confine his dog shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00. Effective April 1, 1967 to March 31, 1969.
