Special Milk Meeting To All Area Dairy Farmers

A special milk meeting open to all area dairy farmers will be held

at 8:15 p. m. Monday, April 3, 1967, in the Presbyterian Parish Hall at Belmont.

The meeting, under the joint sponsorship of Northeast Dairy Cooperative Federation and the Dairyman's League Cooperative Association, will feature a discussion of current dairy industry problems.

This will include reports on the pricing of Class I fluid milk, seasonal pricing plan, the effects and benefits of the new standardization regulations, the recent U. S. Department of Agriculture decision on cooperative payments and the threat of foreign dairy imports on U. S. Markets.

Speakers will be Leo Briggs, Arkport, a Northeast Federation director, and Lester C. Howard, South Dayton, a Dairyman's League director.

ATTENTION DOG OWNERS

A NIGHT QUARANTINE for dogs is in force in this county. It was laid at the request of the county board of supervisors to help protect livestock from dog damage.

Dogs must be securely confined between sunset and one hour after sunrise. Any peace officer shall kill on sight any dog at large in violation of such order. A dog shall not be deemed to be at large if accompanied by and under the full control of the owner.

Any owner of a dog who shall neglect to confine his dog shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00. Effective April 1, 1967 to March 31, 1969.

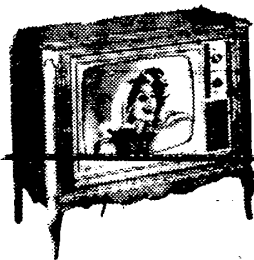
