Small Businessmen May Make Sales Tax Returns Annually

Legislation permitting small businessmen in New York to file to make sales tax returns annually on gross taxable sales, rather than on individual sales, will be on the legislative calendar at Albany before adjournment, according to Assemblyman Frank Walkley.

The opportunity to vote on the legislation follows requests by Assemblyman Walkley and a number of other legislators, including Assemblymen Lloyd Russell and Jess Furman to the Governor to press for legislation allowing a flat, statutory tax rate in place of the present, a tax on those filing an annual business of under \$500,000.

A bill prepared by the Legislative Committee would provide for the change if passed by the Assembly and Senate. The Governor's approval is anticipated.

Both the New York State Assembly and Senate are expected to stay in session through Saturday and into Sunday to wind up business prior to the take over of the Capitol by the Constitutional Convention. Walkley said.

"We do, however, oppose any acts of violence which would impinge upon the rights of others to sell, market or invest their labor, products or capital in any lawful manner.

"Therefore, we are offering this reward of \$500 to help curb criminal, violent and unlawful acts in the current milk dispute and as an aid to the authorities in bringing violators to justice."

Record \$89 Million Highway Bid Opening

J. Burch McMorran, State Superintendent of Public Works has listed the details of 23 highway contracts for which bids will be open April 27. The bidding, involving projects with an estimated cost of \$89,224,000, a new record, was announced previously by Governor Rockefeller.

The former record was set on March 23, 1965, when jobs with an estimated cost of \$85.2 million were offered.

The work involves construction, reconstruction and other improvements on highways in 26 counties in the April 27 letting.

The largest project provides for reconstruction of the interchange of the Brooklyn Queens Expressway (Interstate Route 278) and the Long Island Expressway (Interstate Route 495) in Queens, N. Y., estimated at \$26,995,000.

Other major jobs include construction of 5.2 miles of Interstate Route 84 in Putnam County, estimated to cost \$26,188,000; reconstruction of 3.34 miles of Route 17 and 6 in Orange County, estimated at \$5,132,000; construction of 1.1 miles of the Wantagh-Oyster Bay Expressway in Nassau County, estimated at \$4,822,000.

Also, reconstruction of 5.39 miles of Routes 408, 70 and 70A in Allegany and Steuben Counties, estimated at \$2,872,000; reconstruction of 5.35 miles of County Road 48 in Jefferson County, estimated at \$2,599,000; reconstruction of 0.51 mile of Orangeburg Road in Rockland County, estimated at \$1,770,000; and reconstruction of 8.46 miles of Route 216 in Genesee and Wyoming Counties, estimated at \$1,939,000.

Bids will be opened publicly at 10:30 a. m. in the hearing room of the LPW Administration and Engineering Building at the State Office Building Campus Albany.

Allegany County reconstruction of three one-half mile long, stone and steel groms on protective walls along the west bank of the Genesee River to prevent the erosion of Route 17 in the Town of Belfast and Canada. The grants will be at location south of Belfast, north of Belfast and northeast of Belfast. Estimated at \$316,000.

Allegany & Steuben Counties reconstruction of 5.39 miles of Routes 408, 70 and 70A from 1 mile northwest of the 1 mile junction in Allegany County to early to Route 3 in Steuben County. The 20 and 22 foot x 11 foot walls will be constructed with asphalt concrete. A portion of Route 408 will be relocated and a new bridge will be built over Canasawaga Creek. The 10 foot bridge will be replaced and the Canasawaga Creek bridge, which is rehabilitated as part of the Route 70 reconstruction. Estimated at \$2,872,000.

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
