Current Milk Withholding Reviewed By Board of Directors

Current milk withholding among Current milk withholding among dairymen in the northeast was recently reviewed by the Board of Directors of the largest bargaining cooperative in this area. J. Paul Walizer, or Bellefonte, Pennsyl vania, President of the Board of Directors of Milk Cooperative reported that the 17 members of the Board of Directors of Eastern Milk Producers Coop, were polled to recheck the coop's membership to determine an up-to-date position on milk withholding.

Mr Walizer said, "the majorit, of the Board Indicator that The

The local delegate is an elected officer of each of the 190 Locals of the Eastern Milk Producers Coperative and, as a rule, speaks for the membership on the Local level.

Walizer said, "Eastern Milk Producers is a democratically run orducers is a democratically run organization and its position on policy affecting the entire cooperative must reflect the attitudes of the majority of the overall membership. Even though members in some areas are sympathetic to the withholding action, the great majority as shown by our poll, are opposed."

Within the last 5 weeks at a delegate meeting of the Eastern Milk Producers Cooperative, the delegates failed to support a resolution favoring milk withholding. The individual member, of course, has the choice of making his own decision as to whether or not he desires to withhold his own milk. Eastern to withhold his own milk. Eastern will not place any restrictions on him, nor will it be responsible for any losses of milk in the event the members' milk does not reach the merket place due to withholding or action associated with withholding.
