## School Board Holds Regular ---Meeting

The Andover Central School Board held its regular monthly meeting Monday night in the office of James H. Kessler, Supervising Principal, with all Board Members present and eight visitors in attendance.

Karl Burdick, President of the School Board, declared the meeting officially opened and asked the News Editor if there was anything special that was desired to be brought before the meeting before the reading of the financial reports. Speaking for the Andover News only the Editor stated that the News representatives present wished to observe and report on the entire meeting and the meeting was then begun with the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting. The minutes of the March meeting showed that all board members were present except Karl Burdick who was vacationing in Florida. Feb. bills were read and approved The Cafeteria report showed a total net loss for the fiscal year to date (Feb. 28th) was \$1,790.61. Several teachers had been hired minutes were then approved as read.

Under new business, the clerk and treasurer's report was then read and audited. For the month of March under the General Fund it showed total disbursements of \$39,558,59 leaving a cash balance of \$4,240.05. Under the Federal Fund account, total disbursements were \$5,354,30 leaving an actual cash balance as of Mar. 31 of \$3.45. The Trust and Agency fund showed a net balance of \$10,002.

The total Cafeteria sales showed an income of \$2,838.82 which was a net loss for March of 144.78. This raised the total net loss for the fiscal year to March 31 of \$1,935.30. This financial report was then approved with a total of cash on hand amounting to

\$15,989.12.

Under the payroll account, the totals were read for the regular payroll and then the supplemental payroll was read in detail and both approved as read.

A discussion on Federal Funds for the school library was then held and reported that over \$20,600 worth of books had been added to the grade and high school libraries under this account. It was also reported that old books beyond repair or salvage are burned. This was followed by reading each of the current bills under the general fund which totalled \$8,462 and were approved. A total of \$1,294.45 for cafeteria bills were then read and approved. Bills under Title II for library books provided for by Federal Funds for \$4,806.93 were then read and approved. Under Title I, equipment provided for by the Federal Government, bills for slightly over \$1,700 were read and approved."
