Know Cancer's Warning Signals

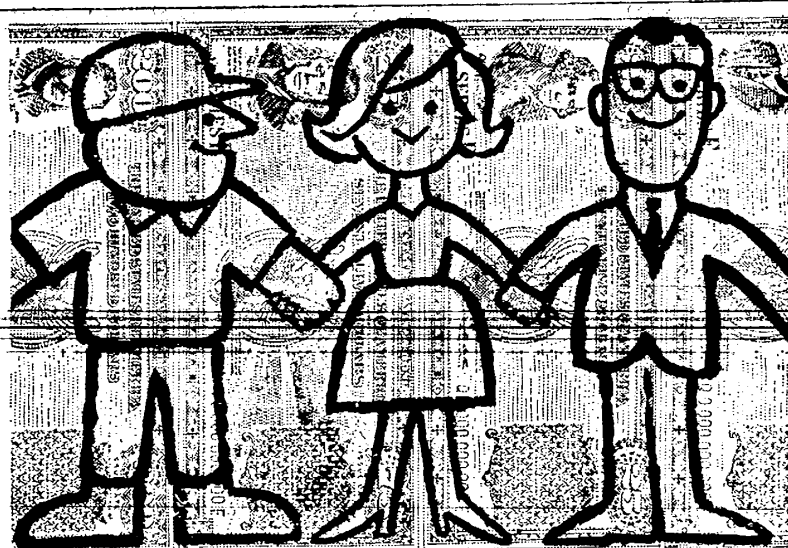
Determined to make the public fully conscious of cancer's warning signals, the American Cancer Society has adopted an "action" approach through a new leaflet, "Know Cancer's Warning Signals". The leaflet, to be left in every home in Allegany County by volunteers during the Society's 1967 educational and fund raising Crusade beginning April 1, 1967, is designed with warning signals listed on a special section which can be torn off and pasted on the family medicine cabinet.

Getting people to read and retain the facts contained in a simple leaflet — even if the facts are vital and life-saving — has proved to be a real challenge. George B. Clark, Jr., President of Allegany County Unit said today. We believe the new action pamphlet may widen public awareness.

Our incentive is the fact that at present only 69 per cent of the people of the country can name even one of cancer's several warning signals, in spite of years of educational effort by the Society.

During the Crusade, when a volunteer urges you to post the warning signals, we hope you will do so, and, most of all, we hope you will heed them and take proper action if action is called for.

Widespread knowledge of the warning signals would mean more checkups and more lives saved.
