### Check Your Registrations 1961, 1962, 1963 Model Renewals Due

The final phase of the transition schedule used since last October to bring all New York State registered motor vehicles under the safety inspection program began this month. Motor Vehicle Commissioner Vincent L. Tofany informs motorists.

Commissioner Tofany reminded registrants that vehicles subject to the Inspection Law, those on model years of 1961, 1962 and 1963 whose registrations were renewed for 1967 last October and November, are due for the safety check this month.

These vehicles, unlike other model years, did not have to be inspected before the owners could have their registrations renewed. The commissioner remarked, but that this time it is to be done before May 1.

Bonnie and her fiancé are both employed by Gilbert and Bennett Manufacturing Company in Georgetown.

If such adjustments or repairs are needed, the owner may have the work done at the inspection station or he can take his vehicle to another repairman. He need not return to the original station for the reinspection, but can go to a different station.

With this in mind and because there are other cars due for inspection this month under the former schedule, Commissioner Tofany urged owners to apply for an inspection as early as possible in the month to have the check performed and to insure meeting the deadline of May 1.

The schedule calls for inspection of 1964 models during May, 1965's during June and 1966's during July. By the end of July, the transition schedule will have been completed and all cars will have been included in the program.

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### Resolution

A Resolution to provide for a partial tax exemption of real property owned by certain persons with limited income who are sixty-five years of age or over.

Resolution by Andover Central School District No. 1, Towns of Andover, Alfred, Wellsville and Ward, Allegany County, and Greenwood, Steuben County, as follows:

Section 1. The purpose of this resolution is to grant a partial exemption from taxation to the extent of fifty per centum of the assessed valuation of real property which is owned by certain persons with limited income who are sixty-five years of age or over meeting the requirements set forth in section four hundred sixty-seven of the Real Property Tax Law.

Section 2. Real property owned by persons sixty-five years of age or over shall be exempt from school taxes to the extent of fifty per centum of the assessed valuation subject to the following conditions:

a. The owner or all of the owners must file an application annually in the assessor's office at least ninety days before the day for filing the final assessment roll or such other time as may be hereafter fixed by law.

b. The income of the owner or the combined income of the owners must not exceed \$3,000 for the twelve consecutive months prior to the date that the application is filed. Where title is vested in either the husband or wife, the combined income may not exceed such sum.

c. Title to the property must be vested in the owner or if more than one, in all the owners for at least sixty consecutive months prior to the date that the application is filed.

d. The property must be used exclusively for residential purposes, be occupied in whole or in part by the owners, and constitute the legal residence of the owners.

Section 3. This Resolution shall take effect April 10, 1967.

## Revised Milk Price Forecast Is Issued

Uniform prices for milk delivered to pool handlers in the New York-New Jersey milkshed during April, May and June will average 20 cents per hundredweight (46.5 quarts) higher than in the same period a year ago, according to a revised price forecast issued April 10. These are prices paid to dairy farmers.

A. J. Pollard, market administrator, said also that the average price handlers will pay for fluid milk (Class I) will be 63 cents higher than a year ago, or \$8.86 per hundredweight.

The administrator said the new price estimates take into account revisions in factors used in forecasting and recent order changes, including the April 1 amendment which eliminated seasonal pricing for Class I milk and set up a seasonal incentive payment plan for dairy farmers.

The anticipated uniform prices are April, \$4.53 per hundredweight, up 18 cents from the same month last year, May, \$4.87, up 21 cents and June, \$4.42, up 20 cents.

It was previously predicted that the uniform prices would be \$4.56 for April, \$4.35 for May and \$4.40 for June.

Dr. Pollard forecast Class I prices at \$5.86 for May, up 74 cents from last year, and \$5.87 for June, up 75 cents. Prior estimates were \$5.07 and \$5.08.

Under the April 1 amendment, Dr. Pollard explained, Class I prices will be at about the same level all year long. A portion of the producers' returns will be deducted in March, April, May and June — months of heavy milk production — and put into an interest bearing account, to be paid back to producers in the shorter production months of August, September, October and November.

The deduction will be 10 cents per hundredweight in March, 20 cents in April and 30 cents in May and June. This year, however, the deduction will be three cents higher because the amendment could not be made effective for March.

Dairy farmers will receive 25 percent of the money in August, 20 percent in September and October and 15 percent in November.

The forecast was issued at the request of members of the dairy industry and other interested persons. Estimates are subject to further revision since all factors used in their preparation are not definitely known at this time.
