Most of the documents on display were shown under yellow light to prevent fading. Many were sealed in helium to preserve them further.

I was greatly interested in the Senate which was in session at the Capital. A senator from Virgi its was chairman. We sat in a balcony high above the Senate Chambers. From these we could se Senator Edward Kennedy and Senator Brooke The discussion was very interesting, but we were allowed only three minutes.

I have a great deal of respect for anything old whether it be human or otherwise, so the Museum of National History, which is part of the vast Smithsonian Institution, held a special attraction for me. Their collection of mummies, however gory it may sound, could not fail to impress a student of History and the Hope Diamond complete with its gurse was equally as fascinating. But the best part was the Anthropology section in which the evolution of man was traced from its beginnings years ago to the present day.

I was very impressed by the Smithsonian Institute. In the Aviation building they have the first hansule that went into space. They also have the Wright Brothers plane and many other, interesting exhibits. ting exhibits.

I was also impressed by the Surreme Court it was very interesting although we were only allowed inside for a short time.

Some of the rooms were so elegant and pieces so beautiful. To me, I believe Washington is the most beautiful city that I have ever seen. One thing I noticed was how clean the streets were and there wasn't much litter on the ground.

I thought the wax museum was one of the most interesting places we visited. It seemed to make aid the things we've read about in history books have a sense of reality. The wax figures were fairly real looking for the most part. One had a chest that moved as if it were alive. It was a wounded soldier, probably dying after the battle of the Alamo. The place that I enjoyed most in Washington was the FBI building. Our group was guided through the building by an agent who explained what the function of the FBI was. I was surprised to learn that the main function of the FBI was to assist other law enforces. was to assist other law enforcement agencies in solving crimes, While in the building we saw the crime labs where most of the acrk is done.
