Senior Trip

The following paragraphs are excerpts taken from compositions which the Seniors wrote concerning their trip to Washington.

The National Archives impressed me more than any other building in Washington. The immensity of the building itself, was very impressive. The architecture and decorative masonry were beautiful. The precautions taken for the safety of the documents were really amazing. The original Declaration of Independence, The Constitution, and The Bill of Rights, were displayed on special bases. These bases could be lowered, in a matter of seconds into a vault in the basement of the building to protect them from attack if a war started. Most of the documents on display were shown under yellow light to prevent fading. Many were sealed in helium to preserve them further.

I was greatly interested in the Senate which was in session at the Capital. A senator from Virginia was chairman. We sat in a balcony high above the Senate Chambers. From there we could see Senator Edward Kennedy and Senator Brooke. The discussion was very interesting, but we were allowed only three minutes.

I have a great deal of respect for anything old whether it be human or otherwise, so the Museum of National History, which is part of the vast Smithsonian Institution, held a special attraction for me. Their collection of mummies, however gory it may sound, could not fail to impress a student of History and the Hope Diamond, complete with its curse, was equally as fascinating. But the best part was the Anthropology section in which the evolution of man was traced from its beginnings years ago to the present day.

I was very impressed by the Smithsonian Institute. In the Aviation building they have the first airplane that went into space. They also have the Wright Brothers plane and many other interesting exhibits.

I was also impressed by the Supreme Court it was very interesting although we were only allowed inside for a short time.

To put it simply, in the Federal Bureau of Engraving and Printing we saw more money there just being around than the average person will make in his whole life. We were shown the printing of

billings which involves several steps. To the checks for misprints and finally the cutting of sheets into separate bills.

One of the places which impressed me the most was Mount Vernon, home of George Washington. I like seeing the place where a very important man lived. When you see the things that belonged to such an important man and to an era in history that has long passed you try to relive it and place yourself there. Some of the rooms were so elegant and pieces so beautiful. It is hard to imagine that some people could live in such a beautiful place and have such luxury then which really would not be considered a luxury now.

To me, I believe Washington is the most beautiful city that I have ever seen. One thing I noticed was how clean the streets were and there wasn't much litter on the ground.

I thought the wax museum was one of the most interesting places we visited. It seemed to make all the things we've read about in history books have a sense of reality. The wax figures were fairly real looking for the most part. One had a chest that moved as if it were alive. It was a wounded soldier, probably dying after the battle of the Alamo. You could look at him and around at all the war torn and blood stained ruins and actually imagine that you were there. It really was a fabulous place.

The place that I enjoyed most in Washington was the FBI building. Our group was guided through the building by an agent who explained what the function of the FBI was. I was surprised to learn that the main function of the FBI was to assist other law enforcement agencies in solving crimes. While in the building we saw the crime labs where most of the actual work is done. We also saw the FBI gun collection and saw several of them demonstrated.

I think I was most impressed by the changing of the guard ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. The ceremony was done with such great precision that it was a tremendous sight. It should be because it represents the soldiers who have sacrificed their lives for our country. The men participating in the ceremony have had a great honor bestowed upon them. For it is up to them to present a proud and honored picture, to people from all over the world, of those who have died for humanity.

Of all the things that impressed me the most was the National Museum of Art. The thought of being in the presence of pieces painted and sculptured in a place like the Florentine School of Art in the 12 and 13 centuries was rather awe inspiring. To look upon original by my favorites such as Van Gogh, Da Vinci, and Corbott was more like a dream than reality, a privilege not to be taken for granted.

Another thing that impressed me was the Franciscan Monastery. Never before have I been in a place of such beauty, friendliness and solitude. Even in the midst of the tour group I felt solitude and comfort.

I was very impressed by the Washington Cathedral. This huge structure houses churches of many faiths. It was started in 1908 and is still under construction and should be finished within the next fifteen years. Another interesting fact is that there is no steel in the structure except a very little in the bell tower. It is held together by pressure of the stones upon and against each other. This Cathedral is really magnificent in structure and beauty within.

Then finally we were all on the bus on our way to Andover, a small town in New York somewhere. That's a wonderful feeling.
