### Professor Says Forsythia Hurt By Cold Winter

When forsythia fails to flower it may be that the previous winter was too cold and flower buds were killed. A Cornell horticulturist has observed. Further, he said that in some areas, the flowers seem to be scattered this year.

Prof. Robert G. Moyer at the Cornell College of Agriculture, Cornell noted forsythia may bloom in one spot, while just a few feet away a lush may be bare of blossoms.

In field studies, Moyer found that the Korean forsythia, Forsythia ovata, continues to be the hardiest and can stand temperatures to 25 degrees below zero. Flower buds of other varieties, including the newer ones, were killed at temperatures much less severe.

Studies show that temperatures can vary widely from one location to another, or at different heights at the same location. These differences may determine whether plants flower or not, and may account for the varying amounts of flower bud injury in different locations in a community.

### Army Offers New Program "Operation Early Choice"

High school seniors interested in fulfilling their military obligation by joining the Army upon graduation may now avoid the June rush and be assured the training of their choice before enlisting, according to Sergeant Buehler, local Army recruiter.

The Army's new "Operation Early Choice" program has been set up to allow interested students to select the training of their choice while a variety of openings is still available. Men who wait until June, Sergeant Buehler, explained find that the high enlistment rate which follows graduation quickly absorbs many of the desirable openings.

"Operation Early Choice" is intended primarily for high school seniors who have not had the opportunity to take the necessary qualification tests during the Easter Vacation. If a student is qualified, he will be able to select his own training and will receive a written guarantee that, following basic training, he will be trained in his chosen field.
