

LIVING UNDER LAW

BILL OF RIGHTS You will find our "Bill of

Rights" in the first ten amendments to



our Federal Constitution. We adopted them all at one time in 1791. Set out

among our guarantees are those of freedom of religion, speech, and the press as well as the right to meet peaceably, and petition for redress of grievances.

Another amendment secures our persons, houses, papers, and effects against unreasonable searches and seizures. No warrants shall issue but upon probable cause, backed by oath or affirmation.

The due process of law amendment covers much ground No court can put us twice in legal jeopardy for the same offense. Nor, in a criminal case, can we be made to a witness against ourselves If our private property is taken for public use we

must get just compensation for it.

We cannot be held for trial for a crime which may bring the death penalty or other infamous crime without grand jury presentment of in-dictment. And, of course, our life, liberty, or property can-not be taken without due pro-cess of law. By this we mean a fair hearing in a court.

The Bill of Rights also secures the right to a speedy cause of the accusation. You can compel defense witnesses to come to court and testify. You can face your accusers and you can have a defense lawyer to speak for you in all criminal cases, whether you can afford it or not.

Thus have we backed up our Declaration of Independence, where it says that men have certain inalienable rights and that to secure them "governments are tuted among men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed.


