International Postage Rates

An increase in international surface and airmail rates went into effect Monday, May 1st, 1967, the first international increase since July, 1961.

The new international rates will not apply to mailing for the members of Armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO'S and FOP'S.

The increases are: Air mail letters to Central America and Caribbean area from 13c a half ounce to 15 cents.

Air mail to the rest of the Western Hemisphere remains 15 cents a half ounce, except for Canada and Mexico.

Air mail for Europe and Mediterranean Africa from 15 cents a half ounce to 20 cents a half ounce.

Air mail letter rates to the rest of the world remain unchanged at 25 cents a half ounce. Aerogrammes and air post cards increased 2 cents each from 11 cents to 13 cents.

Most letters going by surface transportation to all nations (excluding Canada and Mexico) increased from 11 cents to 13 cents. Post cards raised from 7 to 8 cents.

Most parcel post rates to all nations increased 20 cents a parcel, but the weight, after two pounds will be about the same.

Tree Seedlings Available For Reforestation Projects

The New York State Conservation Department announces that tree seedlings are now being offered for sale on a 'cash and carry' basis at the Oak Orchard Nursery.

Species currently available in units of 1,000 are: Scotch pine, white spruce, and larch. These trees are surplus stock and will be sold to eligible landowners for \$10.20 per thousand.

The Oak Orchard Nursery is 7 miles northeast of Oakfield on the East Shelby and Podunk Roads on the Genesee-Orleans County Line. Buyers are advised to call ahead to check on species still in stock. The phone number of the nursery is 7981470. Office hours are from 8 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. Monday thru Friday, and Saturday, May 6 only.

Under state law, the trees must be used for reforestation and cannot be planted for landscaping or ornamental purposes. Once the trees are planted, the roots can never be removed from the

ground. The trees may be cut for Christmas trees.

Each tree species has a specific purpose for which it is usually planted. Scotch pine is planted primarily for Christmas trees. Larch is grown for poles and timber. Whereas, white spruce is popular for both Christmas trees and timber.

When it is decided to reforest an old field or pasture which is free of brush and has good soil drainage, it is helpful to know the soil conditions that are present. Each species needs a particular type of soil in order to grow best.

A Conservation Department Forester is stationed at the Oak Orchard Nursery and may be consulted for specific recommendations and advice as to the species most suitable for the planting site.

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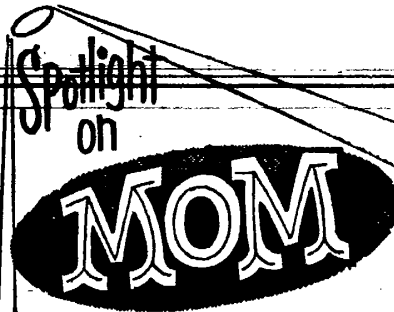
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
