Rural Mailbox Improvement Week May 15 - 30

The purpose of Mailbox Improvement Week is to call attention to the need for providing mail receptacles which are conveniently located, neat in appearance, safe to use, and which protect the mail from the weather.

Mailboxes of the approved traditional or contemporary design are required for the Rural Routes, Patrons still using obsolete top-opening boxes may continue to use them at that location, provided they are kept in serviceable condition and otherwise meet the requirements.

Boxes and supports should be kept painted and free from rust. The name of the owner should be shown on the side of the box visible to the carrier as he approaches, (or a name plate on the top is allowable), or on the door where boxes are grouped.

The mailboxes on the Rural Routes must be located on the right-hand side of the road in the direction of travel of the carrier wherever it would be dangerous to serve the boxes on the left or where this would be a violation of the State or local traffic laws or regulations. When new boxes are installed the boxes should be with the bottom of the box between 4 1/2 and 4 feet from the roadway.
