The new construction and remodeling project at the Green-wood Central School is scheduled to start this week. Final arrange-ments have been worked out bements have been worked out between the State Education Department, the architects, the School Board and the four low bidders, to begin work immediately. The bids for the project were opened on April 14 with the following contractors bidding. On general constructions bids were received from Modern Construction Company, \$265,647.00; L. C. Whitford Co., \$266,000; Holland Lumber Co., The Plumbing contract bidders were J & K, \$48,982; Kenneth Kemp, \$42,145; Shriner, \$39,999; and Ernest Wyand \$38,749. Under the Heating and Ventilation contract bidders were J & K, \$74, 218; American Warming, \$66,880, and Shrine, \$62,207. The bids for

the electric contracts were Angelo Cilano, \$41,900; Box Electric, \$41,285; and Crum Electric, \$36,987.

Since everything seems to be in order, contracts will be signed with the low bidders in each area of construction. The amount of the flour flow bids comes to a total of of \$387,787.00 since this is below the \$397,000 which was authorized by the voters at the last annual meeting the school can accept these bids, sign contracts and proceed with the construction. It has been announced by the Board of Education that since the construction contracts were so close to the \$397,000 authorized by the voters that it will be necessary to delete \$337,000 authorized by the vocas that it will be necessary to delete from the project certain items of materials and equipment in order to provide sufficient finances to pay the incidental expenses on the project. Incidental costs include architect fees, clerk of the works, legal fees, insurance, and a re-

serve fund. The School Board has indicated that it would also take an advantage of a alternate on the swimming pool which would include an all stainless steel pool equipment and fixtures at a cost of \$5500. A letter will be sent to the Greenwood tax payers and voters in the near future explaining all of the problems regarding the finances and a resolution will be voted upon at the annual meeting to allow certain items of equipment to remain in the building project as planned.
