## News That's Print To Fit

Well, guess if the weather — namely two nice days, back to back, can make headlines on the front page of the Buffalo Courier Express, we just can't be too far out of line to remark about it here!

However, we didn't see anything about how cool the nights were up in the Buffalo area. True, we have had several nice spring-like days this week — but do you know how cold it actually got during several of the nights?

Here are the recorded Lows and Highs for the past week thru the courtesy of the "Boys down at the Pump Station": Friday, the 19th — L. 52, H. 54; 20th, L. 47, H. 50; 21st, L. 25, H. 57; 22nd, L. 26, H. 50; 23rd, L. 20, H. 60; 24th, L. 32, H. 66; and today, the 25th, L. 30, and the present reading in the mid-sixties. Now, do you still want to take a chance and put those Memorial Day plants out for another few days — or not?

According to the N. Y. State Dept. of Motor Vehicles, Owners of 1964 model autos and trucks who renewed their registrations last Oct. and Nov., but who have not as yet had the vehicles safety inspected, have less than a week to have the work performed.

It will be unlawful to drive 1961 vehicles after May 31 without the approval sticker — so, if the date fits and you haven't done anything about it — better get busy!

Then a word of warning from the Attorney General's Office — The old "chain letter" scheme which over the years has been revived in various forms to enrich its promoters at the expense of many participants is currently being promoted in New York State. Only this time the scheme involves the exchange of U. S. Savings Bonds — purchased — to lose.

This also reminds us of the fact that a bulletin that we just received from the Better Business Bureau. Perhaps many of you can recall our comments a year ago about a fire alarm system. Well, here are excerpts from the May, 1967 issue of the Better Business Bureau Bulletin under the headline "Death and Deception Sell Fire Alarms" (All quotes are verbatim).

"Vanguard of Western New York, in their newspaper advertising, claims their sales procedures prohibit the use of any 'alarming or gruesome sales films or pictures showing badly burned bodies', but fails to disclose that the 'still' photos of fires, the recording presentation and the sales man's pitch accomplish the necessary emotional disturbance to motivate a consumer into purchasing its fire alarm units. Many people calling the Bureau say they were frightened into purchasing Vanguard's product before making a thorough investigation of the need for such protection in a private home, and before understanding that Vanguard's units (a single station device) is activated by heat, and offers no protection against smoke — a major cause of death in fires!

Vanguard's newspaper advertising also carries the statement: "100% APPROVED BY UNDERWRITERS' LABORATORIES INC." This statement is false and misleading, as the Underwriters' Laboratories informed the Bureau. "That this organization (U.L.) does not 'approve' anything since that word carries a connotation of service beyond the purview of our work, hence, we 'list' devices and do not approve them."

The article then goes on with the Bureau's comments on "Referral Selling" and concludes its remarks under the heading on the "National Situation": "Many states have outlawed 'referral selling' as a protection for residents. The Bureau believes this form of selling is not in the interest of consumers of Western New York."
