N. Y.'s Maple Crop Near Record Low

Near Record Low

For New York maple syrup producers, this was a discouraging spring. New York's production was 270,000 gallons according to the New York Crop Reporting Service of the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This was 210,000 amons below last spring. This season's production was the lowest since 1916 with the exception of 1945 when only 261,000 gallons of syrup were made. New York which had led the Nation in production four of the last five years was surpassed by Vermont's production was surpoduction was foo,000 gallons. Maple syrup production for the Nation was 960,000 gallons, one third lower than last year and a record low. The previous record low erop was in 1945.

Production was down consider ably in all sections of the State Temperatures were either too warm or too cold for good saruns. There were not enoughfreezing nights and warm days for good sap flow. Statewide temperatures in the 90's the week-and of April 1 started bud development and dampened any hope for a good syrup season. The average length of the maple season this spring was 30 days, 11 days shorter than last year. Approximately starting date of the season was March 14 and closing date April 12 Nearly 40 gallons of sap was needed to produce a gallon of syrup this spring.

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
