### To Receive Bachelor Of Science Degree

Miss Emily Ann Alvord, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth B. Alvord, 13 E. Center Street, will be among 179 candidates for degrees at the 16th annual commencement of Rosary Hill College on Sunday, May 28.

A graduate of Andover Central School, Miss Alvord has been a member of the Science and the Mission Clubs at Rosary Hill. For two years, she has served as student affiliate of the American Chemical Society and as its publicity chairman during her senior year. She has also been class representative on the Resident Council, an Honor System advisor, and recipient of a National Science Foundation grant.

Miss Alvord, who has majored in chemistry, will be awarded a Bachelor of Science degree.

### N. Y.'s Maple Crop Near Record Low

For New York maple syrup producers, this was a discouraging spring. New York's production was 270,000 gallons according to the New York Crop Reporting Service of the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. This was 210,000 gallons below last spring. This season's production was the lowest since 1916 with the exception of 1945 when only 261,000 gallons of syrup were made. New York which had led the Nation in production four of the last five years was surpassed by Vermont this spring. Vermont's production was 298,000 gallons. Maple syrup production for the Nation was 960,000 gallons, one third lower than last year and a record low. The previous record low crop was in 1945.

Production was down considerably in all sections of the State. Temperatures were either too warm or too cold for good sap runs. There were not enough freezing nights and warm days for good sap flow. Statewide temperatures in the week-end of April 1 started bud development and dampened any hope for a good syrup season. The average length of the maple season this spring was 30 days, 11 days shorter than last year. Approximately starting date of the season was March 14 and closing date April 12. Nearly 40 gallons of sap was needed to produce a gallon of syrup this spring.

### Local Youth Joins Holstein-Friesian Assn.

Brattleboro, Vt. — Harold Francis Sisson, Jr., Andover, has joined the junior membership ranks of Holstein-Friesian Association of America. Nearly 13,900 youngsters are now actively enrolled in the breed organization's program. To qualify, member candidates must be under 21 years of age and have successfully completed one year's work in a 4-H or vocational agriculture dairy project. Individual ownership of at least one Registered Holstein is also required.

Junior members of the national Association are entitled to all privileges except voting. They may register and transfer their animals at member rates and receive reports of breed and organization progress.

More than 43,500 young Holstein breeders have participated in the program since its start in 1923.

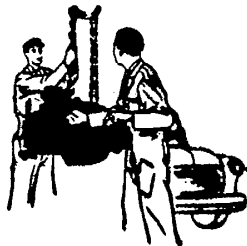
