## Young Men Interested In U. S. Military Schools Contact Rep. Goodell

Rep. Charles E. Goodell, R., N. Y. urges young men interested in competing for appointment to the United States military academies to write him for authority to take the necessary examinations.

The Congressman said a written examination will be held on Tuesday, July 11, 1967, for those interested in seeking his nomination to the academies. The appointees will report to the Academies in the summer of 1968.

The examinations will be held in Jamestown, Olean, Hornell, Elmira, Buffalo, Ithaca and Rochester. It must be taken by those seeking appointments by Rep. Goodell to the U. S. Air Force Academy, the U. S. Military Academy, or the U. S. Naval Academy.

The Congressman said all those interested should write to his Washington office immediately. His address is 1017 Longworth House Office Building, Washington, D. C. 20515.
