Sto-o-o, if you have some spartime—or a loose dime, here is a good place to spend it—on our "citizens of tomorrow"!


Any civic program that encompasses around 180 local bad donated in the summer—sure seems de-

#### T. Joseph Lynch Attends "Water For Peace" Conference

T. Joseph Lynch of Andover Las returned from Washington, D. C. where he participated in the U. S. sponsored International Water for Peace. Conference. The conference was organized by the Departments of Sitte and theinferior. Addressing representatives of

Addressing representatives of 51 nations, President Johnson announced at the conference that the Department of State will set up a new "Water for Peace" office to spur American efforts toward helping the world meet its future water needs.

ing the world meet its future water needs.

Mr. Johnson addressing the opening session of the conference, said he was unhappy and knew the delegates were, too with present progress in gobel water resource development.

"We are not using all of the imagination and all of the enterprise that our problems require", the Trestdent told the Jelegates who heard his keynote speech.
