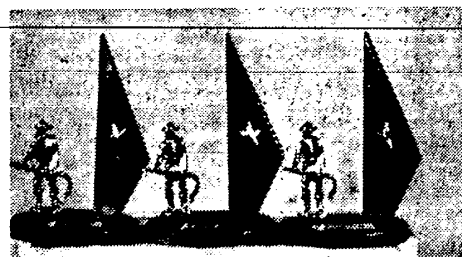
So-o-o, if you have some spare time -- or a loose dime, here is a good place to spend it -- on our "citizens of tomorrow"!

T. Joseph Lynch Attends "Water For Peace" Conference

T. Joseph Lynch of Andover has returned from Washington, D. C. where he participated in the U. S. sponsored International Water for Peace Conference. The conference was organized by the Department of State and the Interior.

Addressing representatives of 51 nations, President Johnson announced at the conference that the Department of State will set up a new "Water for Peace" office to spur American efforts toward helping the world meet its future water needs.

Mr. Johnson, addressing the opening session of the conference, said he was unhappy and knew the delegates were, too, with present progress in global water resource development.

"We are not using all of the imagination and all of the enterprise that our problems require," the President told the delegates who heard his keynote speech.

The "Water for Peace" office, according to current intent, will comprise a small staff charged with planning new or expanded U. S. water aid programs. Its work is expected to include producing legislative proposals that the Johnson Administration could send to Congress next year.

An inter-agency committee is expected to be set up to coordinate such an office under interdepartmental guidance.

The inter-agency panel also recommended that the U. S. government offer to help create or enlarge regional water resource development centers around the world. Mr. Johnson, endorsing this idea, told the delegates the United States "is prepared to join you and all others in establishing a network of such centers."

"We will provide our full share of the expert assistance, and the supplies, and the equipment, and the financing that's needed," he said, adding he was confident the United Nations and other international agencies would play key roles.

The President set a goal of launching two such centers in the next two years "to serve as the source and the goal" to promote water for peace. The centers might provide a wide range of services: expert advice, training, information storage, research and sponsorship of conferences.

Mr. Johnson pledged continued U. S. efforts to advance the frontiers of water science and technology and share findings with other nations. His words had political overtones, because the Soviet Union, the United States chief rival in the international arena, boycotted the eight day conference.

Secretary of State Rusk appeared before the conference and secretary of the Interior, Udall, closed the conference yesterday, May 31.
