Governor Rockefeller has an accounced the award of a contract for \$2,386,832.05 to Hornell Construction Corp., Hornell Construction Corp., Hornell Construction Corp., Hornell Construction Corp., Hornell Construction Routes 408, 70, and 70A in Allegany and Steuben Counties. The firm submitted the lowest of five bids to the State Department of Public Works.

Sections of the routes involved will be resurfaced with asphalt concrete from a point 1.1 mile northwest of the Route 408 junction in Allegany County easterly to Route 36 in Steuben County. A portion of Route 408 will be relocated, and a new bridge will be built over Canaseraga Creek. The Bennett Creek bridge will be rehabilitated appart of the Reute 70 reconstruction.

Scheduled for completion by August 1, 1969, all work will he under the supervision of William J. Dennis, engineer in charge of the Department of Public Works District Office at Hornell.
