### Allegany County Highway And Bridge Project

J. Burch McMorran, State Superintendent of Public Works, has announced that the Department proposes reconstruction of a portion of County Road No. 31 and erection of a new highway bridge in the Town of Friendship, Allegany County.

Any citizen who wishes a public hearing regarding the project and its economic effects should make a written request to the District Engineer, State Department of Public Works, 30 West Main Street, Hornell, New York, on or before June 12, 1967.

The proposed project begins about a quarter mile south east of the junction of State Route 408 and County Road No. 31 in the Village of Friendship, and extends southeasterly along County Road No. 31 for about 0.4 mile, including a bridge over Van Camp Creek. The road would be widened, straightened, and resurfaced, and the existing bridge replaced with a new structure.

Information on this project, and the opportunity to request a public hearing are offered in accordance with provisions of Title 23, U. S. Code, Section 128. If a public hearing is scheduled the date will be advertised.

### Road Contract Awarded To Hornell Firm

Governor Rockefeller has announced the award of a contract for \$2,386,832.05 to Hornell Construction Corp., Hornell, New York, for improvements to 5.99 miles of Routes 408, 70, and 70A in Allegany and Steuben Counties.

The firm submitted the lowest of five bids to the State Department of Public Works. Sections of the routes involved will be resurfaced with asphalt concrete from a point 1.1 mile northwest of the Route 408 junction to Route 36 in Steuben County. A portion of Route 408 will be relocated and a new bridge will be built over Canaseraga Creek. The Bennett Creek bridge will be replaced and the Canaseraga Creek bridge will be rehabilitated as part of the Route 70 reconstruction.

Scheduled for completion by August 1, 1969, all work will be under the supervision of William J. Dennis, engineer in charge of the Department of Public Works District Office at Hornell.

### Leaflet Gives Calorie Facts

Using an artificial sweetener in coffee while eating a hot fudge sundae for dessert is hardly the way to lose weight.

Yet a general lack of understanding about the calories content of food often leads to such irrationality in dieting, according to Profs. Ruth Klippstein and Marjorie Washbon of the N. Y. State College of Home Economics, Cornell University, authors of a new leaflet.

"Calorie Sense and Nonsense," Cornell home economics extension leaflet 41, discusses basic facts about the balance of food calories and activity necessary for intelligent decisions about weight control.

Maintaining weight consistent with good health is every individual's personal responsibility, the authors emphasize. "In today's push-button life, inactivity may be more of the cause of overweight than in Grandma's day. Increasing regular activity can often help use up excess calories."

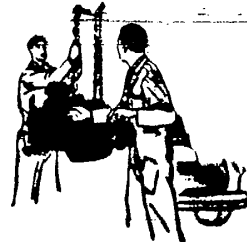
The bride-elect, a graduate of Wellsville High School in 1966, is now employed at Burroughs Corporation, Rochester.
