Receive Law Degree

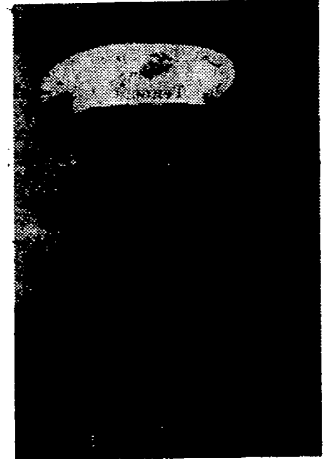

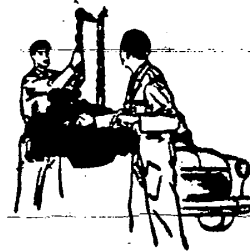


Pvt. William L. Schrader
