News For Students Needing Working Papers For Summer Jobs

James H. Kessler, principal of Andover High School, today reminded students that "the laws of the State of New York allow you, as minors, to work this summer if the work you perform is a proper type for your age group and will not injure your health. By obtaining working papers, you and your employer are making sure that you are physically able to cope with his job."

Mr. Kessler also said that the medical examination which is given before working papers are issued is one of the best means of protecting the teenager's health and well-being.

"The hours you may work are regulated by the Labor Law and enforced by the State Department of Labor," the school official pointed out, "to ensure your having time for recreation as well as employment. Remember, however, that it is much better to find out ahead of time that working, on a particular job, is beyond your capabilities."

Students from 14 up to 18 years of age who plan to work this summer were reminded today to get their working papers before school closes. Principal James H. Kessler of Andover High School said the school will aid youngsters in preparing their applications for standard employment certificates for vacation or farm work permits, and would arrange appointments with the school physician for the necessary physical fitness tests.

The school officials warned that delays might occur if pupils delay completing their applications until after school closes.

Youngsters under 18 who have already left school and who have not yet obtained working papers should apply at the public school office nearest their home for application blanks and instruction folders.

Curtains made from glass fibers should be hand washed only and should not be rubbed or wrung.
