


PLANNING A CARE-FREE VACATION TRIP?

Are you planning a vacation trip? If so, and you would like to make it as care-free as possible and wish to eliminate almost all of the dangers within your control, here are some suggestions from professional sources: Have your car safety-checked before you leave. Don't risk a breakdown on the highway. Have a competent mechanic check your brakes, steering, lights, tires, windshield wipers, cooling systems, and engine.

If you don't have seat belts, have them installed and learn to use them. Seat belts spell the difference between safety and suffering.

Plan your trip — and rests — in advance. Knowing your route will make driving easier, and reduce your chances of getting lost or confused in traffic.

Plan to travel when traffic is lightest; during weekdays, and between peak morning and evening hours.

When driving in unfamiliar areas, follow these basic safety rules: stay alert at all times; heed all warning signs such as CURVE, HILL, or NARROW RIDGE; and be especially alert for pedestrians when passing resort areas.

Watch out for fatigue, never drive more than 2 hours without a rest or coffee-break.

Take along a flashlight, basic tools for minor repairs, and a First Aid Kit.

Keep your children and pets out of the front seat as they become bored and restless on long trips — and are apt to distract the driver.

Keep the doors locked while the car is in motion not only to keep the passengers from falling out — but also to keep undesirables from getting in when you stop at a traffic light or an obstruction in the highway.

Keep the rear windows rolled up high enough to prevent your children from sticking their hands or heads out.

Provide car games to keep the children amused — there are several books of children's games on the market, or even invent your own — such as keeping track of how many different makes of cars you meet.

Know and obey the basic rules and regulations for safe driving. Watch out for the speed limits that are posted — both on the highway — and through small hamlets, villages, and zoned areas.

And last — but not least — **PROTECT YOUR CAR!** When parking, always — Close all windows! Lock all doors! Take credit cards and valuable papers with you! Keep valuables out of sight! Lock the ignition! Take your keys with you! Keep information about your car with you to help Police recover the vehicle quickly if it is stolen!

Notice of School Meeting
Andover Central School

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the annual meeting of the inhabitants of Central School District No. 1 of Andover, Allegany County, qualified to vote at school meeting in said district will be held at the school house in said district on Tuesday, July 11, 1967 at 8:00 o'clock p. m., for the transaction of such business as is authorized by the Education Law.

And notice is also given that a copy of the statement of the amount of money which will be required for the ensuing year for school purposes exclusive of public monies, may be obtained by any taxpayer in the said district during the seven days immediately preceding the annual meeting except Saturday, Sunday or holiday at each of the following schoolhouses in which school is maintained during the hours designated:

Andover Central School, 9 - 12 a. m. and 1 - 4 p. m.

And notice is also given that petitions nominating candidates for the office of member of the board of education must be filed with the clerk of the district not later than June 27, 1967.

The following vacancies are to be filled on the Board of Education:

Term: Five years (Name of last incumbent: Walter Gath).

Each vacancy requires a separate petition to nominate a candidate to each separate office. Each petition must be directed to the clerk of the district, must be signed by at least twenty-five qualified voters of the district must state the name and residence of the candidate and must describe the specific vacancy for which the candidate is nominated including at least the length of the term of office and the name of the last incumbent.

Also vote on the following Resolutions:

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of Central School District No. 1, Towns of Andover, Alfred, Wellsville, Independence, and Ward, Allegany County, and Greenwood Steuben County, is hereby authorized and directed to purchase one school bus and expend therefor a gross sum not exceeding \$8,950.00, and that there shall be applied to the purchase any trade-in allowance to be received for a bus now owned by the school district, and that the afore said total sum of \$8,950.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by tax on the taxable property of the school district to be collected in annual installments; and further resolved that the Board of Education is authorized to issue obligations of the district therefor in accordance with the Education Law and Local Finance Law.
