

Red's Racetrack Rambles

Hello again all you racing fans. Well, once again the elements interfered to halt the racing card at the Woodhull Race way Saturday night — but this time there was plenty of racing action before the rains came.

The evening was warm and humid with a good-sized crowd on hand — and the drivers sure put on a good show since the cars seem to run faster and better when the air is damp.

The Features that had been postponed from June 3rd due to a power failure, were run off first with Carl Ferrin, No. C-6, winning the Hooligan Feature; Phil Pipe, No. 71, taking the Sportsman Feature; and Basil Shutt, No. 13, winning the Modern Feature.

By the time that the regular evening's racing card got under way, the weather really turned threatening — with a distant thunderstorm lighting up the sky with occasional flashes of lightning. And, apparently as a result of this storm, one of the thrills of the evening happened during one of the Sportsman's heats.

We were out in the infield ready to catch an action shot — and now we know just exactly what that old expression: "taking a shot in the dark" really means.

Yep, the boys were really burning up the track, when all of a sudden — all of the lights went out — and was it ever dark in a hurry! We could hear the car engines roaring away — and could visualize in our own mind the chain reaction that could be happening out in front of us — out in back of us — OUT IN BACK OF US! Wow! Where in hell were those danglers anyway! Were they plowing into each other as they tried to stop — running out into the fields cross-lot — going up on the bank, or even into the pits?

Well anyway, before we could decide which way to shoot a picture — if any — the lights came back on again as a distant circuit-breaker evidently kicked back in again — and there were the cars all nicely stopped in different positions all the way around the track — and off the track as well. Run by the time that the "Indian-File" re-start was ready to get under motion, all of the cars were lined up in position — so evidently no one got banged-up very much as a result of the black-out!

In the 2nd Modern Heat, Gabe Hanes, driving Stevie Baker's No. 5, jumped out to an early lead and appeared to have the race pretty well sewed-up but Basil Shutt, No. 13, finally worked his way up thru the slower traffic and rapidly closed the gap. Then with just two laps to go, Basil dove down under Gabe between the No. 1 and No. 2 turns and pulled out into the lead. Gabe then tried to do the same thing between the No. 3 and No. 4 turns — but as he stomped on it coming down the chute, the back-end of No. 3 whipped into No. 13 — and Basil really had his hands full of steering wheel trying to keep his car from going up onto the bank in front of the crowd. However, by magnificent control, he not only kept his car on the track — but also held onto the No. 1 slot, so that when they crossed the finish line a few seconds later — Basil was No. 1, and Gabe was No. 2.

Then, not to be out-done, in the next race which was the Sportsman's "Consy", the boys got all tangled up on the 1st lap trying to get out into the lead — not once — but twice. Thus it took 2 different re-starts before the race finally got under way — and of course, each time the disabled cars had to be towed off the track.

Thus, by the time that the Sportsman's Feature got under way, so much time had elapsed that the storm was fast approaching despite the fact that no intermission was taken. However, it held off until the race was almost over with and then it started to sprinkle — and then pour.

As soon as the cars started to break-away on the track — the race was stopped when the lead car came by the starter with Larry Scouten, No. 13, being declared the winner.

Thus, the Modern Feature and the Hooligans will run off these 2 features this coming week, before the regular racing card gets under way.

In the Make-up Modern Feature — Basil Shutt, No. 13, was 1st; Gabe Hanes, No. 3, 2nd; Gary Shults, No. 7, 3rd; Bob Paul, No. 243, 4th; and Warren Kinney, No. 16, 5th.

In the regular racing card, in the Sportsman's Class — Hugh Smith, No. 55, took the 1st heat; Bob English, No. 66Jr., won the 2nd heat; Larry Scouten, No. 13, took the "Consy" and then won the Feature; with Mike Clark, No. 7/11X, placing 2nd; Chuck Kennison, No. 9, 3rd; Phil Pipe, No. 71, 4th; and Brian Woodworth, No. BC, 5th.

In the Modern Class, Gary Shults, No. 7, took the 1st heat; Basil Shutt, No. 13, the 2nd; and Ray Kent, No. 28, captured the "Consy". And, as we have already said, the Feature was rained-off and will be run this coming week.

In the Hooligan Class, Chuck Kennison, No. 3C, won the 1st heat; and that Feature was also rained-off and will be run this week.

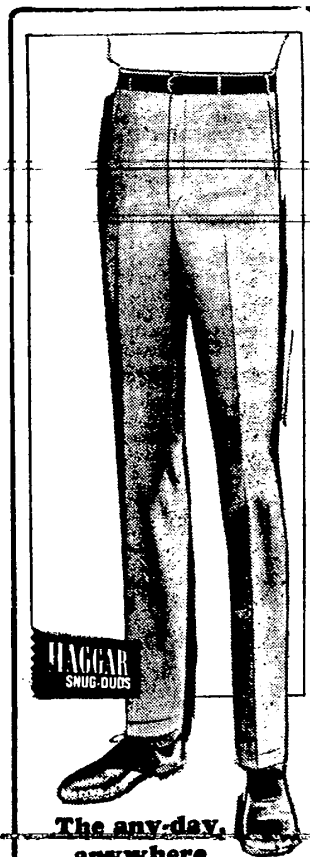

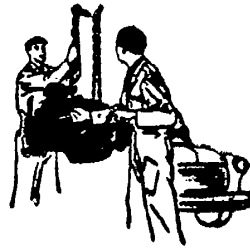


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
