1965 Autos Due For Inspection In June

Motorists who own 1965 automobiles and trucks exempt from compulsory inspection are reminded that the vehicles are due for inspection before the end of June.

The Department of Motor Vehicles points out, however, that if these owners have had the inspection performed since the vehicles were registered for the current year, they need not have it done again.

The Department suggests that the owners of 1965 models check if they have inspection stickers on their windshields to make certain that the inspection has been done. The sticker also will tell them when the next inspection is due.

Persons who purchase used cars, either from a dealer or a private party, are responsible to see that the car is inspected, although some dealers do so before delivery. The inspection must be passed before the used car may be registered.

July marks the end of the transition inspection schedule and by August 1, all New York-registered motor vehicles will have joined in the program. From then on, owners will be able to select their own inspection schedule, providing ensuing inspections are passed within a 12-month period of each other.

Black Bass Season Opened June 17th

Black Bass and Muskellunge season opened June 17, the State Conservation Department reminded anglers.

On a State-wide basis, these seasons run June 17 - November 30. A bass "keeper" must be at least 10 inches long, and the daily limit is six. Minimum length for a muskie is 28 inches, and there is no Statewide limit on the take.

However, the Department advised anglers, special regulations govern minimum length, daily limit, and the season itself in certain waters.

This year the most notable regulation — and the only one not listed in the "Hunting-Trapping-Fishing Guide" — is the start of the bass season in Lake Champlain. This opening date was recently agreed upon with the State of Vermont to provide a uniform opening for the entire lake. The season will run June 10 - November 30. Minimum length is 10 inches and the limit is 10 per person per day.

The waters of Lake Champlain, for the purposes of this regulation, are: Lake Champlain, including South Bay and the waters of East Bay upstream to the first highway bridge in the village of Whitehall and to the confluence of the Poultney River and Hubbardtown River.

The bass season in Lake George and its tributaries runs from August 1 to October 31.

The muskie season in Chautauque and Cattaraugus Counties (except in Lake Erie) runs from June 17 to October 31, and there are several special regulations concerning licenses, limits and equipment.

The muskie limit in the St. Lawrence River is two per person per day.

The Department urges all anglers to check the "Fishing" section of the "Hunting-Trapping-Fishing Guide" to make sure they know about the special regulations in any waters they fish. This free publication is available at any license-issuing agency.
