New Pharmacy Fee Schedule In Effect

A new pharmacy fee schedule for Medicaid providing a 66.6 per cent markup with a guaranteed minimum of \$1.50 per prescription has been put into effect, Dr. Hollis S. Ingraham, State Health Commissioner, announced.

It replaces a schedule with a 60 per cent markup and a \$1 mm imum.

The schedule is being well.

The schedule is being mailed to licensed registered ists in the State, including the approximately 12,000 in practice at the 6,000 pharmacies in the State.

It was established by the Interdepartmental Committee on Health Economics and approved by the Director of the Budget.

Thus ratculated on a percent age markup basis are the prescriptions at more than 60 percent of the pharmacies in the State.

Facts About Permanent Personal Registration

The Commissioners of Election of Allegany County, Catherine B. Dean and Gerald N. Mabey, today advised The Andover News that a great deal of confusion has developed over the precedures of registering voters under the new Permanent Personal Registration system.

They state that EVERY voter

They state that EVERY votor in Allegany County must register in person this year. There will be three ways to do so. The Commissioner urge all voters to take advantage of their first opportunity to register. Those who wait may find long lines and registration may close before they are able to register.

"Central registration is being and will continue to be conducted at the Board of Elections office in the Courthouse in Belmont, N. Y. during the hours of 9:00 A. M. to 12:00 noon and 1:00 P. M. to 5:00 P. M. Monday through Friday until September 5th. The Commissioners continue to urge all Allegany County Voters who are able to, to stop in at the office and register. There are no waiting lines at present and it only takes about five minutes.

Traveling branch offices will

about five minutes.

Traveling branch offices will also conduct Central Registration in the various villages and communities throughout the County from now until September 5th. A complete schedule of dates, hours and location of the branch offices will be published as soon as we can make the arrangements and draw the schedules. In the meantime we will publish temporary schedules from day to day, as far in advance as possible, where and when the branch office will operate.

Central Registration, both in

our office and at the traveling branch office, is for ALL the voters of the county. Any qual-ified voter from any locality in the county may register at any Central Registration office where-ever it may be in Aliegany Coun-ty

In addition to Central Registra-In addition to Central Registra-tion there will be at least four and possibly eight days of LOCAL REGISTRATION in October. Local Registration will be conducted in each of the 48 election districts by the local Board of Election Inspectors. Any voter who has not registered under Central Registration may do so at their local district registration

at their local district registration in October.

We cannot emphasize too strongly the adviseability of registering early. People being human tend to put these things off until the last minute. Obviously we cannot register 20,000 voters at the last minute, or even in the last few days.

A second reason for early reg-

A second reason for early registration is that the Election Law provides that the county may reduce Local Registration from eight to four days if 50 per cent of the eligible voters are registered before September 5th. This reduction would save every town in Allegany County a considerable amount of money."
