## "Sense In The Sun"

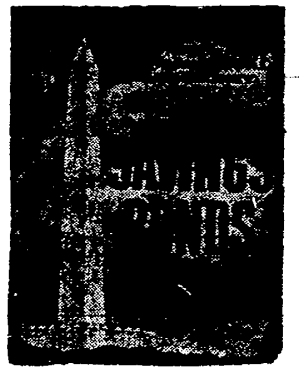

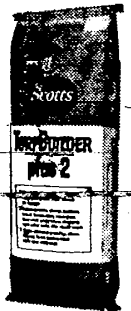
