The girls then set out and were successful in getting local merchants to each donate a trophy for prizes to be awarded for Parade Winners in different classes.

Invitations were sent out to local and surrounding area organizations to enter a marching unit in the parade, with local businessmen and citizens being urged to sponsor a float of some kind. And, despite the fact that many groups and citizens had had prior commitments, the Parade turned out to be a big success.

The Queen Contest was turned over to the School with the student body selecting Susan Reil as Queen, and Gayle Clarke, Gail Bronson, and Marianne Meyn as Attendants.

Linda Davis, last year's Queen, crowned Susan Reil Queen just before the parade started with "Jim" Mulholland presenting the Queen and her Attendants with corsages in behalf of the Mulholland Funeral Home.

Earl J. ("Doc") Allen was Grand Marshal of the Parade which was started off around 11:00 a. m. by "Jim" Mulholland, who was Parade Marshal, and broadcast live over Radio Station WLSV.

Following the Parade, a tasty Bar-B-Que chicken dinner was served by the Andover Rod & Gun Club members on the School Grounds.

By the time that the dinner was over with, local Firemen had the rides all set up and in operation as well as their novelty stands.

Other stands that were on hand to serve the public: Food Concessions run by the Boy Scouts; Pop Stand by the Cub Scouts; Candy Booth run by the Firemen's Auxiliary selling home made fudge and candy; while the Senior Class had charge of the pop corn stand.

The Andover Rescue Squad put on a First Aid Demonstration at 2:30, and then the local Babe Ruth team lost a thrilling regular league game to Cuba by a score of 4 - 3.

The fireworks display which was the largest on the local scene in many years, was attended by an even larger crowd than in previous years with an estimated 5,000 or more people present.

One of the innovations of this year's Celebration was a free advertising program that was printed up and passed out before the Parade under the Chairmanship of Larry Ryckman. This program was titled "Our Heritage" which commemorated the "Diamond Jubilee" of the State of Andover.
