A GLANCE AT THE SCHOOL BUDGET

An Editorial

Have you read the Proposed Annual School Budget for 1967 - 1968 that appears in this week's issue of the Andover News?

Do you understand it? Do you have any questions as to how over one half a Million Dollars is to be spent?

We picked up a copy of the new budget yesterday and spent quite sometime going over it and comparing it with last year's. Then we spent several more hours checking over our conclusions with the Clerk of the School Board to make sure that there were no misinterpretations in the items as listed.

To begin with, this year's budget is made up so that it is easier to follow, with several items being

broken down for easier comprehension.

The total budget is \$67,519.64 higher than last year's. However, of this entire amount, \$45,720 is for the salaries of additional teachers and salary increases (that are mandated by the State).

There is an increase of \$3,725 under the heading of "Transportation" but included in this is an extra item for \$3,000 for Vocational Board.

The Operation and Maintenance of Plant has been pared down \$2,430 lower than last year.

Employees Benefits is up \$6,537 from last year but this has been made necessary by the Federal raise in Social Security which went into effect the first of the year in January.

The Principal of Debt Service has dropped \$2,925 with a corresponding drop in Interest for this item.

These are the major changes in the proposed budget for 1967-68 as compared with last year's as far as expenditures are concerned.

Now, on the other side of the ledger, which is per haps of the most interest to the local Taxpayers, the Estimated Total To Be Raised By Real Property Tax Levy For School Purposes comes to \$110,375.81. This is an increase of \$19,243.89 over last year's budget to be raised by local School Taxes.

However, this figure can vary either up or down since it is contingent on the amount of State Aid that is estimated to be received from the proceeds of the new State Lottery.

In our discussion of the School Budget with the Clerk of the School board, we were assured that expenditures had been cut or kept down to a practical minimum and that the new Budget compared very favorably with the budgets of Schools in our immediate surrounding area.

Now Taxpayers, the responsibility of the educa tion of your children rests with you.

Next Tuesday evening, July 11, the Annual Meet ing of the inhabitants of Central School District No. 1 of Andover will be held in the gym at 8:00 p. m., for the transaction of such business as is authorized by the Education Law.

There will be an election of a candidate to serve for a five (5) year term on the School Board. And, it is a contested election since there are two candidates that have announced that they are running for this

The Proposed Budget will be discussed, explained, and voted on.

The Financial Report for the fiscal year 1966 -1967 will be given and other pertinent business discus sed and acted upon.

If you aren't interested in what over \$500 Thousand Dollars will be spent for — or, who is elected to serve on the School Board - don't bother to attend the Annual Meeting.

If YOU are INTERESTED — at least attend to see how your money is being spent-ask any questions that you may have in your mind pertaining to the budgeted operation of YOUR SCHOOL — and vote for the Candidate of YOUR choice to serve as YOUR representative on the School Board.
