Receive "His and Hers" Degrees

"His and hers" graduate degrees were awarded to Dr. and Mrs. Harvey Saalberg at the Columbia University graduation ceremonies.

Mrs. Saalberg is the former Gloria Ellis of Andover, and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Hurlbert of Alfred Station, N. Y.

Dr. Saalberg received a doctorate in journalism which he completed in January, and his wife received a master's degree in geography.

The Saalbergs have left for Kent Ohio, where Dr. Saalberg has accepted a position as assistant professor of journalism at Kent State University.

The Saalberg family including daughters, Julie, 11, and Ann, 7, have been in Columbia since August 1965.

Dr. and Mrs. Saalberg met while they were attending State Teachers College in Oswego N. Y. After graduation Mrs. Saalberg taught grade school while her husband served in the Army in this country and Korea.

They toured Japan in 1954, and following Dr. Saalberg's release from active duty he earned a master's degree in journalism at Syracuse University in 1956. He then taught English and journalism at Central High School in Omaha, for four years and at West Essex High School, North Caldwell, N. J., for five years. He was also advisor to the school's newspaper and yearbook staffs.

Dr. Saalberg first came to Columbia in the summer of 1958. He attended the School of Journalism for three summers before returning for his residence in the fall of 1965.

Since Ann was ready for first grade, the Saalbergs decided to make it "double or nothing" — that is, they would both work full-time for graduate degrees as long as funds and stamina permitted.

For Mrs. Saalberg, returning to school meant giving up her work in the League of Women Voters and the YMCA planning board and church work, but she felt that furthering her knowledge of geography was worth the sacrifice of more relaxing activities.

The Saalbergs' home in Columbia was their fourth in 11 years not to mention several other apartment addresses and Splinter Village, the temporary but still existing veterans' housing units in Syracuse.

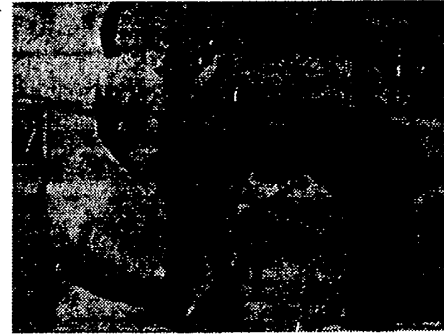

Area Grandfather Re-Enlists In Navy Seeking Duty In Viet Nam

Rodney Burley a 46 year old grandfather, of Christian Hollow Rd., Greenwood, reenlisted in the Navy last Thursday and made application for duty in Viet Nam.

A World War II veteran in the Army, Burley's last active duty was from 39 - 45, although he has been active in both the Naval and Air Force Reserves since 1952.

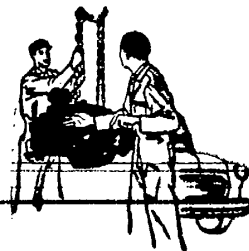
When asked why he re-enlisted Burley stated, "It's something I have wanted to do for a long time, because the Navy's retirement is far superior to anything civilian life has to offer, but it wasn't economically practical until the Navy came out with their Special Rating Program."

Petty Officer Little, area Navy Recruiter, explained, "Under the Special Rating Program we enlist

civilian craftsmen in the pay grade for which they are qualified by their level of civilian skill. Burley was a master builder and since the Navy is putting 40 million dollars worth of construction in place every month in VietNam, we were able to offer Burley a good deal. On his next re-enlistment he will be eligible for a bonus of up to ten thousand dollars. With today's pay scales for senior Petty Officers, we can take most civilian craftsmen into the Navy at about the same thing they are making in civilian life, sometimes more."

Petty Officer Burley is married to the former Miss Cora Bassett, also of Greenwood. They have three children and one grandchild. Petty Officer Burley will be transferred to Brooklyn, N. Y. for further assignment. His family plans to remain in Greenwood.

Petty Officer Little, area Navy Recruiter, commented, "In my opinion Burley's patriotic response to our country's call to arms proves that we are not becoming a county of protesters and flag burners."
