Howard Nichols Sells Partnership In Garage

Howard Nichols today announced that he has sold his partnership interest in the Andover Garage to Russ Crittenden, Dyke St., Andover, effective immediately.

Howard and Don Nichols opened their garage on April 1, 1946 in the old Ligouri Lynch property on Main St. and moved to their present location on Nov. 1947.

In 1960 when the new Highway (Route 21) was built, the Nichols over, the two brothers opened their new garage of which construction was started on in 1959 and have operated it continuously since then.

Howard was hospitalized in November for a minor ailment and then shortly afterwards had to return to Strong Memorial Hospital for a serious stomach operation coming home in December.

However, his recovery from this operation wasn't complete and he returned to Strong Memorial in January and wasn't discharged until March 23rd.

He was able to return to work in the garage around the first part of June, but decided that the daily grind was more than his health could stand.

Mr. Crittenden, who has been working in the Garage since last November during Howard's illness, in addition to working for Sunnydale, expressed his desire to become a partner in the business so the necessary arrangements were made.

Russ and Don will continue to operate the Garage and the Keystone Distribution in the same manner that Don and Howard have for so many years.

At the present time, Nichols tells us that he has no definite plans for the future except to take it easy until his health is fully recovered.

152 Taxpayers Vote On School Budget

The Annual Meeting of the voters of Central School District No. 1, Andover, Allegany County, New York, was called to order by Alan Tuttle, Clerk of the Board of Education Tuesday evening, July 11, 1967 at 8:00 p. m.

Nominations were opened for Chairman of the meeting. Nominated was Lawrence Corwin. Motion made by Harold Huffcut, seconded by Carl Atwell, that Lawrence Corwin act as Chairman of the Annual Meeting. The motion was carried.

Mr. Corwin appointed Miss Agnes Taylor to serve as Secretary for the meeting. Also, the following Tellers were appointed by Mr. Corwin: Harold Huffcut and Harold Rice, to officiate over all ballot voting.

The Chairman also appointed Mrs. Doris MacMichael and Mrs. Elsie Kent, assistant Secretaries, to take the names of voters.

Minutes of the last Annual Meeting were read by John Bridge. Motion for approval of the minutes was made by Philip MacMichael, and seconded by Carl Atwell.

The following reports were also read by John Bridge:

Annual Financial Report for the school year 1966-67, showing balance on hand to July 1, 1967 of \$21,871.91.

Tax Collector's Report for the school year 1966-67: Amount of taxes levied \$91,142.65 Total Taxes collected \$85,551.34 Total taxes returned to County \$5,591.31

Treasurer's Report showing a balance on hand to July 1, 1967 of \$21,871.91.

A motion to accept the above reports was made by Mrs. Jean Lang, and seconded by Mrs. Madeline Shellman.

Board Clerk, Alan Tuttle read the Proposed Annual Budget for the school year 1967-68, for \$575,886.91, explaining any sizeable changes in amounts over the previous year's budget, and answering questions from the floor.

Mr. Tuttle proposed a new procedure in the manner of voting which has been adopted by other school districts in the area. Voting on the Election of a Trustee to succeed Walter Gath, the Proposition to purchase a new School Bus, and acceptance of the School budget for 1967-68. The ballot contains all three propositions and can be completed at one time.

The following resolution was presented by Mr. Tuttle:

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education, School District No. 1 Towns of Andover, Alfred, Wellsville, Independence, Ward and Greenwood in the counties of Allegany and Steuben by and hereby is authorized: to expend the sum set forth above of \$575,886.91; to accumulate a planned balance of \$2,000.00, as of July 1, 1968, and to levy the necessary tax there for.

The resolution for the bus purchase was read as follows:

RESOLVED, That the Board of Education of Central School District No. 1, Towns of Andover, Alfred, Wellsville, Independence, and Ward Allegany County; and Greenwood, Steuben County, is hereby authorized and directed to purchase one school bus and expend therefor a gross sum not exceeding \$8,950.00, and that there shall be applied to the purchase any trade-in allowance to be received for a bus now owned by the school district, and that the aforesaid total sum of \$8,950.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be raised by tax on the taxable property of the school district to be collected in annual installments; and further resolved that the Board of Education is authorized to issue obligations of the district therefor in accordance with the Education Law and Local Finance Law.
