### Sterling College Gospel Tones To Present Musical Program

The Sterling College Gospel Tones, a talented octet of students accompanied by Leon Aken, Professor of Vocal Music, will present a program of vocal music at the Andover Presbyterian Church on Monday evening July 24, at 8:00 P. M.

The group, which has won a variety of contests that win carry them west and then to the east coast before returning to Sterling, Kansas. They will give performances in Colorado, Wyoming, Nebraska, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Maryland, New York, Massachusetts, and New Jersey as well as Kansas.

Expected to travel more than 1,000 miles during the seventy days of the tour, the Gospel Tones will

perform in church groups, civic auditions, and youth meetings as well as in radio and television appearances. They also will sing at the Canadian Exposition.

Offering a program of gospel music with a modern emphasis, the group will perform a variety of songs, including spirituals, hymns, and popular songs, and will vary their program with piano and organ accompaniment.

### "Ted" Smith Attends Science Foundation Course

Dr. Ted Smith, professor of biology at the University of New Hampshire, is participating in a National Science Foundation Summer Institute at St. Lawrence University in Canton, New York. Professor Smith is studying the science of animal behavior or ethology, a new and rapidly expanding field which relates closely to many basic and applied areas of biology and psychology including ecology, genetics, systematics, physiology and wildlife management.

The purpose of the six week institute, which began July 2nd, is to provide the participants with a broad background in animal behavior and to relate the subject matter to their teaching. The seven member staff of the Institute are among the nation's leading ethologists and have been brought to St. Lawrence from Michigan State University, University of New Hampshire, Cornell University, John Hopkins University, Utah State University, Tufts University and the University of Wisconsin. Professor Smith is attending daily lecture sessions in the morning and participating in laboratory exercises and research activities in the afternoon. In addition a series of evening lectures by visiting scientists is also being conducted for the participants.

Mr. Smith's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Smith reside at 3 Elm Street in Andover.

Leon Aken who directs the group and serves as sponsor has had a wide experience of choral and solo work. On the faculty at Sterling College since 1940 with the exception of four years in military service during World War II, Aken has traveled widely with the Concert Choir of the college and with other groups similar to the Gospel Tones.
