Heavy Milk Producers Remain In Herd Longer

Ithaca, N. Y. — The amount of milk a cow produces is the single most important factor determining the length of time she stays in a herd, a Cornell University animal scientist has reported.

Thirty-nine per cent of the cows producing 500 pounds of milk more than their herdmates stay in the herd through six lactations as compared to 27 per cent producing 500 pounds less than their herdmates.

These results of a study were reported by Prof. H. Wilmer Carter, N. Y. State College of Agriculture, Cornell.

Carter found a high correlation between animals completing a second lactation and those completing fourth and sixth lactations. Therefore, he said, a dairy man looking for cows that will stay in the herd for a reasonable length of time should check the production of a second lactation.

The study indicated that high production is the most important single factor necessary for long herd life. Carter said data indicated that cows must have good udders, milk out fairly rapidly, and have sound feet and legs if they are to stay in the herd for several years.

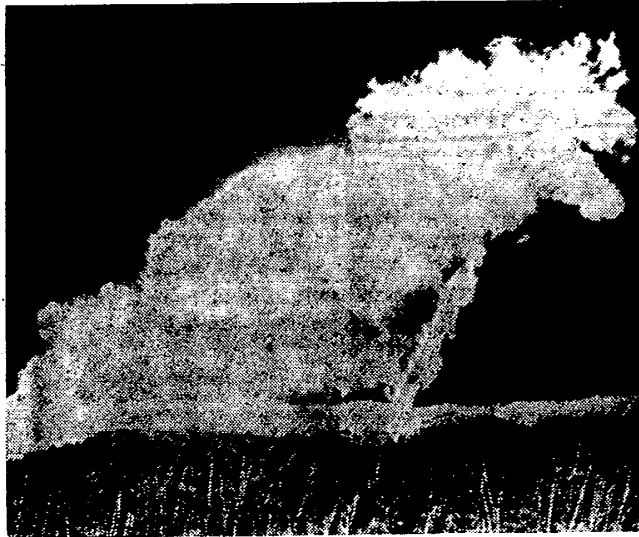
Carter pointed out these data refute the old argument that high producing cows burn out and leave the herd at a young age.
