Brian Lynch Wins Blue Awards At County Fair

Allegany County Fair at Angelica was a rewarding and enjoyable experience this year for Brian Lynch, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles G. Lynch. Among several ribbons won by the young man was second blue placement received by Keena, a registered Shetland yearling owned and shown by Brian. Other blue placements were awarded Brian and his faithful Sox in single driving and costume classes.

In costume Brian and Sox depicted a woodsman and his logging horse "skidding" a log which was actually a fence post. For this they received top blue.

This year marked Sox's 10th anniversary being shown at the County Fair, having been nine times driven "in the blue" by all four of the Lynch children. Three times he placed top in the driving class and twice top in pleasure pony ridden. Sox always competes like a real showman and has also won some enviable prizes in neighboring counties.

Charles E. Goodell Reports From Washington On Selective Service

After considerable National debate, Congress has taken action to extend the draft system until July 1, 1971. Basically, it is the same law that was enacted in 1940 as the clouds of war gathered over the world. The essential part of the law has been, and will continue to be, the great control over deferments exercised by the local board. The changes enacted into the new law, however, will mean that approximately 170,000 young men who could have expected deferments will have to report for active duty.

Every young man will have to register when he is 18 and is subject to call when he becomes 19 years of age. During the coming months of 1967, it is expected that the monthly draft calls will average about 28,000 young men — nearly twice as high as they have been for the first half of this year. How soon a registrant can expect to be called will depend on the exact size of the draft call, the number of deferments in his local board area, and the individual's own status.

Under the new law, those who are delinquent in registering or who fail to keep the local board advised of changes in their location will be the first called, followed by those who volunteer to be drafted. Next will be single men and those married after August 26, 1965, who are between 19 and 26 and not deferred for some other reason. College students, pursuing full-time work toward a degree in a satisfactory way, should find it easier under the new law to get a deferment. It will be more difficult, however, for those in graduate school to continue to get deferred from active duty. Part-time college courses usually will not result in a deferment.

The President's proposals and the present action to extend the draft system fell far short of the kind of overall revamping necessary in the Selective Service System. In the long run, it would appear that pay and other conditions in the military service should be improved to the point where they are a sufficient inducement to develop a volunteer professional career Army, Air Force, Navy and Marine Corps.
