ORDINANCE FOR PUBLIC PEACE AND ORDER
Section 1. Disturbance in public buildings.
No person shall make, aid, countenance or assist in making any noise, disturbance or improper diversion by whistling, stamping, shouting or indulging in any improper conduct or conversation in any church, public hall, tavern, theatre operestaurant of this Village, to the annoyance or disturbance of any person or persons there assembled for any lawful purpose, or in any room or building where any number of persons are so lawfully assembled for any such purpose.

PENALTY. A penalty of not less than \$15.00 nor exceeding \$50.00, is hereby prescribed for each violation of Sec. I. of this constitute disorderly conduct and the person violating the same shall be a disorderly person.

Section 2. Improper noises. No person shall open or allow to be open a muffler cut-off on a motor vehicle or motorcycle while the engine therein is running, or such purpose. PENALTY.
