Legal Notice

ARTICLE I. NOTICE OF VILLAGE ORDINANCE FOR PUBLIC PEACE AND ORDER.

The Board of Trustees of the Village of Andover, County of Allegany and State of New York, does on the 8th day of August 1967, hereby propose the following Ordinance, to promote and enforce public peace and order within the corporate limits of the Village of Andover, and a public hearing will be held on the said Ordinances, on the 18th day of August 1967, at 8:00 P. M., at the Village Office, Andover, N. Y.

ORDINANCE FOR PUBLIC PEACE AND ORDER

Section 1. Disturbance in public buildings.

No person shall make, aid, countenance or assist in making any noise, disturbance or improper diversion by whistling, stamping, shouting or indulging in any improper conduct or conversation in any church, public hall, tavern, theatre or restaurant of this Village, to the annoyance or disturbance of any person or persons there assembled for any lawful purpose, or in any room or building where any number of persons are so lawfully assembled for any such purpose.

PENALTY. A penalty of not less than \$15.00 nor exceeding \$50.00, is hereby prescribed for each violation of Sec. 1. of this Ordinance, and such violation shall constitute disorderly conduct and the person violating the same shall be a disorderly person.

Section 2. Improper noises. No person shall open or allow to be open a muffler cut-off on a motor vehicle or motorcycle while the engine therein is running, or run or operate, or allow to run or be operated any gasoline or oil engines without a proper and reasonable muffler; nor shall any noises be allowed within the Village limits which shall unreasonably disturb the public peace and order within the village limits.

PENALTY. A penalty of not less than \$10.00, nor exceeding \$25.00 is hereby prescribed for each violation of this Section 2 of the above ordinance, and any such violation shall constitute disorderly conduct and the person violating the same shall be a disorderly person.

ARTICLE VII

The following section of Article VII of the Village Code is hereby proposed:

Section II. Stop Intersections. (b) The intersection of Greenwood and Second Street is hereby designated as a stop intersection and a stop sign shall be erected on Second Street at its entrance to the said intersection from the North and South, and the following new Section II, Stop Intersection (b) is hereby enacted as follows:

Section II. Stop Intersection (b). The intersection of Green

ent and the future, New York State must maintain an appropriate and adequate basis in law in governmental structure and — most important to us taxpayers — in financing. Some of this basis takes its form under general constitutional authorization, some is directly specified in the present Constitution and some has developed without any mention in the Constitution.

The present Constitution, in Article XI, requires the Legislature to "provide for the maintenance and support of a system of free common schools, where in all of the children of this State may be educated."

The Constitution also provides for the Board of Regents as the head of the State Education Department. This is the policy-making group at all levels. Its powers, which may be increased or decreased by the Legislature, include the regulation of professions, libraries and many other educational undertakings.

One item sure to come before the Delegates at the Constitutional Convention will be a proposal made by the Convention President Anthony J. Travia to extend the concept of free education to higher education.

With the necessity of education in our society, much of the Convention's time will be spent debating the future course of this State's education. We have over 3.5 million youngsters in public schools with over 170,000 full-time professional teachers. Add to this the 900,000 children in private schools and 670,000 students in institutions of higher education, and you can begin to grasp the significance of this four billion dollar industry.

Education affects us all and your Delegates would like to have your opinions on education and the State's role in it.

The above items have been very often of the State is greatly affected by all the issues that before the Convention.
