Civil Defense Will Not Be Abolished

Albany—July 29 — State Civil Defense Director M. J. Asensio to-day issued a categorical denial of rumors that civil defense had been or would be abolished in any community in the State. "Such roports are entirely amfounded", General Asensio declared. "No jurisdiction has abolished civil defense, nor could such action be condoned as it would be in direct violation of the law", the Director said.

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The law referrel to is the New York State Defense Emergency Act, Article III, Section 22, states in part:

"Local civil defense. 1. Every county — and every city shall prepare and make effective a plan of civil defense conforming to the plan, regulations and orders of the Commission.

"2. The chief executive officers (of each county) shall create an office of civil defense to perform his duties and execute his powers under this section. The head of such office shall be tallocal director of civil defense. The chief executive officer may be the local director or civil defense. The chief executive officer may be the local director or he may appoint and at pleasure remove a local director."

Commenting on reports that a growing number of jurisdiction were contemplating the elimination of civil defense activities, the State Director said, "The provisions of the law obviously preclude such an action. Neither the Commission nor any other element of responsible government would advocate disobeying the law."

The new Cuba plant will also help abate polu-

tion of the Allegany River".

The total cost of the project to which Federal grants may be applied is \$363,483. Cuba received \$151,250 in Federal grants or 49.84 per cent. State grants can be made only for the portion of costs of work begun after May 12, 1965, when the Pure Water program went into effect. The applicable amount for Cuba is \$44,600 and the State grant repre-

plicable amount for Cuba is \$44,-600 and the State grant represents 30 per cent.


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
