A pump truck, tank truck, and 35 men of the Whitesville Fire Department responded to the alarm. A pump truck and tank truck were sent from Genesee, Pa., and the town of Willing sent a pump truck. Andover Fire Department stood by during the alarm.

A pump truck remained on the scene all night and twice wetted down the ruins.

The Billings family includes four boys and a girl, all in elementary school age or younger. Their home and its contents were a total loss.

Billings reportedly will rebuild on the site of the fire.

Missilemen Present Nike Exhibit At Erie Co. Fair

"Nike in the Attack", a graphic demonstration of defense for the major metropolitan and strategic areas of our country, will be one of the featured attractions at the Erie County Fair, Hamburg, New York, August 19 to August 26. The show is presented by a team of 15 missilemen from Headquarters, 1st Region, United States Army, Air Defense Command, Fort Totten, Long Island.

From the warning of an impending attack to the launch of a simulated firing of a Nike missile, the audience will see for itself just what would happen when Nike sites near their community swing into action. Authentic electronic control equipment and cutaway models of Nike missiles are used as props in the demonstration.

During the show a simulated firing of the missile takes place and its destructive power again a high speed jet fighter is dramatically portrayed. Other subjects covered are the history of rockets and missiles, the use of rocketry and missiles today, the operation of a rocket motor, explanation of the control and guidance equipment, explanation of the Nike family of missiles and the advantages of such weapons to include the latest development progress of the anti-missile missile system.

The Army demonstration team travels extensively through a five state area with the public service show, hauling its equipment in seven van-type trucks.
