## July Farm Milk Price At \$4.99

A uniform farm price of \$4.99 per hundredweight (46.5 quarts) will be paid to dairy farmers for July milk deliveries to pool handlers in the New York-New Jersey milkshed, it has been announced. The June price was \$4.42; \$4.77 was paid in July, 1966.

Dr. A. J. Pollard, market administrator, reported that receipts from producers totaled 884,529, 192 pounds, 19,531,941 pounds or 2.2 percent under July, 1966, and that sales of fluid milk (Class I) amounted to 12,653,130 pounds, or 10.7 percent, to 412,648,370 pounds.

About 9,000,000 pounds of the Class I increase was due to milk standardizing by handlers. Also contributing was the loss of several milk plants to the Delaware

Valley marketing order, some of which sell milk in the New York-New Jersey marketing area.

Class I milk comprised 46.7 percent of the pool. The administrator pointed out, however, that under the March 1 amendment to the orders designed to prevent price drop due to standardization a percentage of 47.7 will be used in computations. Handlers paid \$6.06 per hundredweight for milk received in the 201-210 mile zone and used as fluid.

Receipts at bulk tank units rose 54,719,724 pounds to 492,073,641 pounds, or 55.6 percent of the pool. Dr. Pollard said. The percentage increase was 48.1. The number of bulk producers increased by

1,045 to 13,329, but the total number of dairy farmers in the pool dropped by 3,160 to 32,996.

Average deliveries per day per dairy for all producers were up 58 pounds to 845 pounds. The number of handlers' reports used in computing the pool declined by 27 to 227; there was a decrease of 27 to 293 in the number of bulk tank units.

The farm value of July deliveries was \$44,485,765.92. Dr. Pollard pointed out that this figure does not include all the differentials paid to dairy farmers.

The uniform farm price of \$4.99 per hundredweight will be paid for milk testing 3.5 percent butterfat in the 201-210 mile zone from New York City.

## Robert Lynch Attends American Institute Of Cooperation

Robert Lynch accompanied Walter Forshee of Cato, Howard Burdick of Elm Valley and Glen Brown of Randolph and attended the 39th annual summer session of the American Institute of Cooperation at Purdue University Lafayette, Ind., August 6 - 9.

Robert was among some 850 youth scholars to attend.

The delegates, from 41 states as well as England, Denmark, Puerto Rico and Canada, participated in a special three-day program especially for the young people. Major attention was given to the need for greater involvement of young farmers and youth in farmer cooperatives and ways to encourage and help them find lucrative and satisfying careers in agribusiness.

Theme of the three-day meeting was "Cooperatives-Pacesetters".

The American Institute of Cooperation was organized as a university, and incorporated in the District of Columbia in 1925. Often called "a university without a campus", it holds sessions each August at a Land-Grant university which loans its facilities to the largest annual conference on farm business matters.

A I.C. is governed by 60 trustees and financed by dues from farmer cooperatives in U. S., Puerto Rico and Canada. Over a period of 18 years some 14,200 youth and youth leaders from these same states and countries have attended the Institute.

Fifteen different youth organizations send representatives to A. I. C. Among the 15, such readily recognized organizations as Future Farmers, 4-H, Farm Bureau, Future Homemakers, National Grange, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of America and National Milk Producers Fed. are represented.

This year Purdue University was a beautiful location for the A.I.C. Many of the group meetings were held in their Music Hall which is second largest in the world. Radio City in New York, being largest.

Any youth is fortunate to be a part of such an undertaking. It is interesting to note that Robert is the second of the Charles

G. Lynch family to attend A.I.C. Vicki was a representative from New York State Dairy Industry when A.I.C. was held on Michigan State campus in 1964.

Some 3,000 agricultural leaders, as well as the young farmers and rural youth scholars, including representatives of 17 rural youth organizations, attended the Institute.

## Color Outdoor Recreation Map Available

A new, enlarged, full-color edition of New York's "Outdoor Recreation Map" is now available, the State Conservation Department has announced.

The free 32" x 36" folder features a large map of New York State — one likely to be displayed on many a home and office wall. All public and major facilities operated by the Conservation Department are indicated in color. Forest Preserve land, State Parks and historic sites and boat launching sites, public campsites and fishing streams, fish hatcheries, fire towers and some major hiking trails are marked on the map.

Three smaller maps — conveniently located just beneath the large one — outline the State Park regions, forestry districts, and fish and game regions into which the State is divided for administrative purposes. Headquarters of each region or district are listed.

The reverse side of the folder is equally colorful and is jam-packed with information about the facilities shown on the map. Facilities are located by county, by nearest community, and by a simple code and grid system. The map is designed to be used in conjunction with any standard touring map of New York State.
