The Allegany County Board of Supervisors Monday unanimously voted to draft to oppose portions of the State Penal Law regarding justifiable use of force. The motion directed County Atty. James Sikras of Wellsville to draft the resolution after board members heard Allegany County District Attorney Edward F. Mergler declare the new law has "gone a little too far." In other action the board reappointed Dr. Robert Common, Andover, Dentist, to another four-year term on the Public Health Committee.

### 1968 College-Bound Students

Vice Admiral B. J. Semmes, Jr., Chief of Naval Personnel, has announced that the 22nd annual national competitive examination for the Regular Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps (NROTC) will be given on 9 December 1967.

The Regular NROTC Program prepares a young man for a Navy or Marine Corps commission while he is studying at one of 52 civilian colleges. All tuition, fees, uniforms, and books are furnished by the Navy, and the student receives \$50 per month and subsistence allowance for not more than four years. During the summers between academic years, the student participates in interesting at-sea training periods as a Midshipman. After successfully completing a baccalaureate level college course, he is commissioned in the Regular Navy or Marine Corps.

Eligible high school seniors and graduates should submit their applications before 17 November 1967. Application forms are available from high school counselors and Navy Recruiting Stations, or from the Chief of Naval Personnel (Pers-B6411), Department of the Navy, Washington, D. C. 20370.

### Returning Servicemen Entitled To Fringe Benefits

Veterans who return to the place where they worked before entering the military service are entitled to the same fringe benefits they would have received if they had never entered the Armed Forces.

This reminder came from Dow E. Walker, Regional Director of the U.S. Labor Department's Office of Veterans Reemployment Rights.

According to Mr. Walker, fringe benefits to which the returning veterans are entitled may include increased vacation time, sick leave, retirement and profit-sharing rights, depending on union contract or employer practices.

Mr. Walker added that the returning veteran may also be entitled to the vacation time that he would normally have earned in the year of his return from military service.

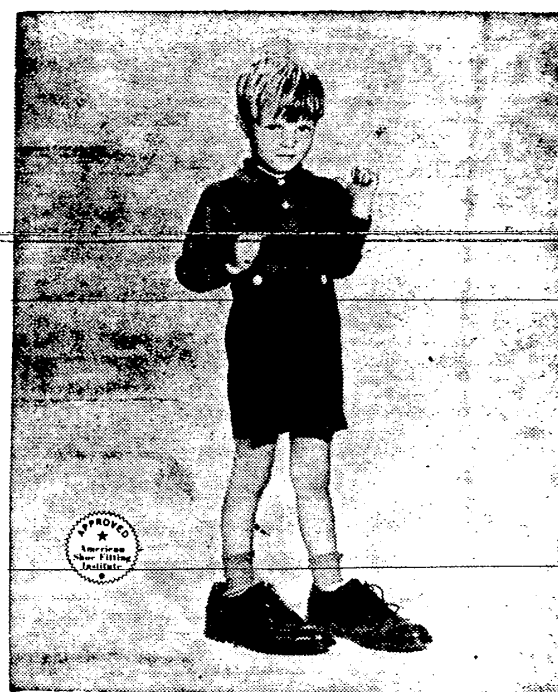
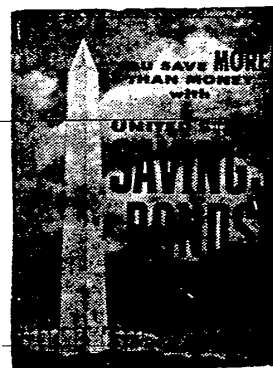
