

Head-On Crash Sends Three To Hospital

A Head-On crash on the over-head two miles West of Andover towards Wellsville on Route 17 early Friday evening sent two local young women and an Emira man to the Jones Memorial Hospital for emergency treatment.

According to a police report, a new Chrysler driven by Victor Rymders, 74, of Elmira, traveling east on Route 17, west of Route 21, crossed over the double solid line and hit head-on the car driven by Mrs. Bonnie J. Fanton, 21, of Andover, RD 1, which was traveling West on Route 17.

Mr. Rymders is reported to have suffered a broken nose as well as back and leg injuries and was issued a summons by Trooper K. F. Kirsch of the Wellsville based State Police for driving while intoxicated.

Both Mrs. Fanton, and Cheryl Steadman of 54 North Main S. Andover, a passenger in the car suffered severe lacerations of the forehead and chin as well as other injuries. Near-by neighbors who heard the crash, rushed the two injured young ladies to Jones Memorial Hospital.

Mrs. Fanton returned home Monday and Cheryl Steadman was released from the hospital Wednesday under family care at home.

Hello again, all you faithful readers. Yep, we are back home again after our 18 day tour of duty for Uncle Sam at Fort Knox, Kentucky!

More than likely, a lot of you are wondering what the "scoop" is all about when local Reserve Officers are called to active duty for a short period of time—and we will have to admit we were as much in the dark when we left home as you all were. All that the telegram, (TWX in army terms) said was to report at Ft. Knox for duty not earlier than 0800 August 2nd and not later than 1700 on the same day.

However, upon our arrival there, we found that we were assigned to the First Army USAR Evaluation Board that was set up to rate the 89th Training Division from Kansas and Colorado. Thus, we were duly processed, oriented and given our bid red "E" that was part of our uniform and was worn as an arm band on our left shoulder.

Ft. Knox, the "Armored Center of the World", had changed a great deal since our last tour of duty there with a lot of permanent-type buildings having mushroomed up all over the place. But after funds had been approved for the construction of a lot of Officers Quarters, and many of the old buildings razed for this new project, our friend, the Secretary of Defense, had pulled the purse strings shut—and no buildings. Thus, most of the Field Grade Officers that were in our group were quartered (in fact practically "hung") in an old wooden temporary barracks that was listed as "inadequate housing" and REALLY was! And was it ever HOT in the little clothes closets that they called rooms! Outside of that one glaring deficiency, we had wonderful cooperation from everyone on the Post—and even the NPs let us alone despite the fact that Radar was very much in effect all over the streets and high ways on the Post.

While down there we had the pleasure of calling on Sgt. Donald Swartz and his new bride, the former Elsie Kohler, from Andover. Sgt. Swartz is in an Air Cavalry Squadron that is getting ready for overseas duty and as Supply Sgt., is a pretty busy guy. However, we had a chance to catch up on he and his wife a couple of evenings and bend our elbows a little while chatting about "y'all home town."

Like all other Tours of Duty in the Army, we met some nice guys, had a lot of hard work and responsibility—which we took care of to the best of our abilities, and were only too happy when we turned in our reports, took care of our responsibilities as Officers, and were able to hit the sign-out register and head for home.

Despite the hardship placed on our families back home in carrying out our business affairs, it still gives most Reserve Officers a feeling of satisfaction of having been privileged to serve their country in their own minute way during such trying times as we are passing through today.

Now back on the home front! We notice that a lot has been going on in the three short weeks that we were away and most of it is things that we will have to dig into a little before we can report accurately enough on.
