



## Tom York Receives 'God and Country' Award

Tom York, 14, son of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas York of Greenwood Hill, received the "God and Country" award in the First Presbyterian Church in Andover, New York, Sunday, August 20th.

Tom, who has been a Scout for three years, has worked his way up to Life Scout which he recently earned at Camp Corton between the 6th and 13th of August.

He belongs to Greenwood Troop No. 62, of which Ed Mullen is Scoutmaster, and has been working on this "God and Country" Award for the past year.

Tom is the second member of the York family to receive this coveted award since his older brother, Roger, received the same award from the First Presbyterian Church in Andover in Feb. 1964.

The main things that Tom has had to accomplish to earn this award are:

1. Memorize main Bible passages thru daily Bible reading.
2. Give systematically to support the Church or Sunday School.
3. Be able to lead the public in prayer.
4. Write to a missionary and make a map showing mission stations of the church of his denomination.
5. Do service projects for one year such as: ushering for six months and singing in the choir for six months.
6. Regular attendance at Church, and youth group, learn and direct group games.
7. Know the history of his Church, read important parts of its constitution, as well as know the historic Church symbols, and then give a statement of his beliefs on it.
8. Interview a Christian businessman.
9. Plan a special observance for a family holiday, birthday or other.
10. Attend an Old Folks Home or other welfare work.
11. Participate in a camp conference and a youth rally.

This entire program is closely supervised by the Minister of the Church to which the Scout belongs and entails a great deal of time and effort on both sides. Thus Tom and Rev. Poole are both to be commended on their rewarding efforts.

## September 5th Deadline For Party Permits

The State Conservation Department today reminded that time is running out for hunters who wish to apply for a special permit to take an additional deer during the 1967 big game season.

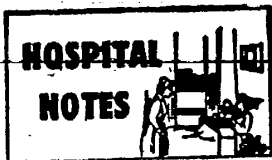
Tuesday, Sept. 5, marks the end of the application period for 55,175 party permits being made available to "parties" of hunters who may take one deer in addition to any deer legally allowed individual members of the party. Application forms and instruction sheets are available at all outlets where hunters normally purchase hunting and fishing licenses.

Under the 1967 party permit program, permits are being offered in 15 areas of the state where the Department feels that additional deer should be harvested to keep deer numbers in close balance with available winter food supplies.

Of the 73,654 deer harvested last year, 20,288 were taken on party permits. A total of 60,041 "parties" were licensed.

Under provisions of the program only applications postmarked Sept. 5 or earlier are accepted. Where the permit quota is greater than the number of applications all parties receive permits. Where the reverse is true, more applicants than permits, parties are selected on a random basis.

New York's Big Game Season starts October 25 in the Adirondack and northern zone and November 20 in the southern and western portions of the State.

## Split 45-Day Duck And Coot Seasons Announced

Split 45-day duck, coot and gallinule hunting seasons have been set for upstate New York the Conservation Department announced today.

Most of the upstate area (exclusive of the "special" Lake Champlain region) will be open for ducks from Oct. 14 through Nov. 17, and from Dec. 14 through Dec. 22. A straight 70 day season will run from Oct. 14 through Dec. 22. And, the special season for scaup ducks only will be held Dec. 24 through Jan. 7.

The Lake Champlain season will coincide with Vermont's waterfowl hunting dates which is expected to be announced in early September. (The Lake Champlain waterfowl hunting region lies east and north of the Delaware and Hudson Railroad tracks running south from the Canadian border to Whitehall and east to the New York-Vermont boundary).

For the Long Island region, including that portion of Westchester County south of Hutchinson River Parkway, the duck season will be a straight 50 days, Nov. 4 to Dec. 23. This conforms with the New Jersey season. The scaup bonus will coincide with the upstate New York season, Dec. 24 to Jan. 7. Geese and brant may be taken from Oct. 21 to Nov. 11 and Nov. 22 to Jan. 6. This 70 day split season coincides with the Connecticut season.

A special coastal season on scoters, eiders and oldsquaws runs from Sept. 25 to Jan. 10. (The special coastal area includes those waters lying in the Atlantic Ocean and Long Island and Block Island Sounds and the waters of Gardiner's Bay lying east of a line from the Long Beach Light to the most easterly point of Ram Head on Shelter Island, and the coastal waters south of Long Island). In this area hunters may pursue and shoot crippled waterfowl from a boat under power within 200 yards of a fixed shooting position. In all other areas where sea ducks may be taken only during the regular season, it is illegal to shoot crippled birds from a boat under power or sail.

Weather laws for all regular waterfowl season, will be from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. This is a continuation of last year's policy, and the Conservation Department cautions hunters to be sure of their target in the early morning gloom before pulling the trigger. During the special upstate season on scaup only, shooting hours will be from sunrise to sunset to protect canvasbacks which may be present at that time. On Long Island, where canvasbacks do not present this problem, shooting during all waterfowl seasons begins half an hour before sunrise.

Bag limits on ducks, other than mergansers, during the regular waterfowl season, are three per day and six in possession, but no more than two wood ducks, one canvasback or two black ducks may be taken per day and no more than four wood ducks, one canvasback or four black ducks may be kept in possession. Mergansers may be taken at the rate of five per day and 10 in possession, of which only one per day and two in possession may be hooded mergansers. The daily bag and possession limits on sea ducks (scoter, eider and oldsquaw) are 7 and 14, respectively.

During the special upstate and Long Island seasons, five scaup are allowed in the bag daily and 10 in possession. Bag limit on geese remain at two per day and four in possession. For brant it is six per day and six in possession. For coots the daily bag and possession limits are 10 and 20 while for gallinules the bag is 15 and 30. A new provision places gallinules in the waterfowl season instead of with rails as formerly. Hunting from power boats is allowed this year — although the
