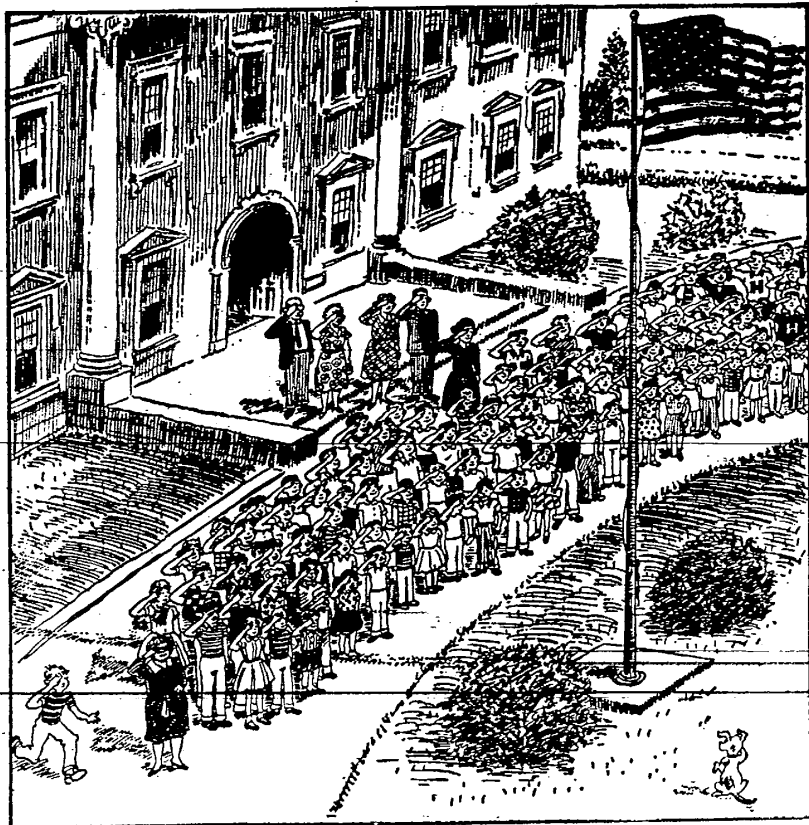


## A Salute to the New Year of School



### Andover's Police Chief Not Leaving

The addition of Andover to the list of communities in which police vacancies may be filled by the Civil Service (CS) examination in October, does not mean that Andover faces the loss of its present principal law-enforcer.

Police Patrolman Ray L. Witte, formerly an Olean patrolman, said today he has no plans to resign, and understands the examination in the Andover case is fully to comply with CS formalities.

The Allegany County CS Commission announced the open competitive examination for police patrolman in the Village of Wellsville, paying \$4,992; and added an "expected" vacancy in Andover paying \$6,100.

The examination will be held Oct. 21 and applications will be accepted up to Sept. 13 in the Belmont Court House.

John J. Powers of Belmont, executive secretary, noted that minimum qualifications include residence in Allegany, Cattaraugus, Steuben, Livingston or Wyoming counties at least four months before the written test.

Candidates must be between 21 and 29 years of age. Graduation from a senior high school or a high school equivalency diploma are required.

When we stopped in to see "Jim" Brinker at his Gulf Station about an ad, he proudly showed us a memento he had just received from his Combat Unit in Vietnam.

The memento was a brand new Zippo lighter with his Brigade Crest fastened on to the front of the lighter, and on the back of it was a Combat Infantry Badge, etched and engraved into the case together with: S/Sgt. James Brinker, Vietnam and the date served there.

Along with the lighter was a letter which read as follows:

We stressed the endurance of hardships, attention to detail, the ability to endure loneliness and sorrow; the acceptance of brotherhood, and a magnitude of other subjects too numerous to mention.

The object of this token is to remind you that there is some good in the worst ordeals. If you have learned from this school how to appreciate the things you once took for granted; if you have learned the true meaning of hard ship, both physical and mental and left the sorrow of the loss of a fellow soldier; if you have learned to accept brotherhood, regardless of race, creed, or religion, and to judge each man by his own merits; then, Ex-Warrior, this token of little monetary value is worth a million.

### New Bus Service To N. Y. City For Andover Residents

Effective Sunday, September 3, Short Line (Hudson Transit Lines Inc.) Bus Company will provide a new service operating between Jamestown, N. Y., and New York City over Route 17 serving intermediate points to New York City.

"Inauguration of this service answers a long-felt need" Samuel B. Jamieson, vice president of the bus line explained. "Until now residents of the Jamestown-Corning area along Route 17 had no convenient or direct public transportation to or from New York City."

The new service is the result of extensive hearings held in Jamestown, New York before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Short Line will be providing two round trips daily leaving Jamestown at 7:30 A. M., and 2:30 P. M. The return schedules leave New York City at 10:30 and 2:30 P. M. Departure times to New York City from intermediate cities are as follows: Andover — 10 A. M., and 4:50 P. M.; Wellsville, 9:50 A. M. and 4:45 P. M.; and Painted Post at 10:45 A. M., and 5:45 P. M. Equipment to be used will be the new modern Eagle Bus.

Short Line operates a fleet of air-conditioned, rest room equipped buses between New York City terminals and Rockland, Sullivan, Ulster, Orange and Greene Counties in New York, Bergen County in northern New Jersey, and Pike and Wayne Counties in Pennsylvania.
