

The North Atlantic Region in ternal Revenue Service, announced today that if 900,000 install ed today that of 900,000 install ment notices for third quarter estimated income tax being issued commencing August 26, about 30,000 will be in error. These notices will be sent to tax payer; throughout one Region which comprises the New England states and New York State.

The erroneous notices do not effect credit for second quarter payments, most or which sere received late. Con, dutation of payment such for the third install ment, therefore, includes the second installment.

Tanpaners who receive there bills should subtract the amounof the second quarter payment and react only the correct install ment with a copy of the notice in most instances, the correct in stallment will equal one half the amount tilled

LIVING UNDER LAW

CITIZEN'S ARREST

The fear that crime is on the rise has caused some groups to "lend a hand" at law enforcement.



Since the days of common law, citi-zens have played a role,

often a risky one to deter crime

New York law glace a citt acn limited power to make an arrest. To help keep the peace, the citizen can stop any crime that takes place in his actual presence. Petty thefts, disturbing the peace, assaults, and other "misdemeanors" fall into this class. He can use reasonable force" to bring the offender in, but no more.

the like - the citizen can again use reasonable force to make an arrest. He can chase and catch the offender Should be the mistaken, the law still may regard his ar rest to be for "reason ble cau: ." If he had good reasons to suspe t a person of bur glary or other felonics

risks. Suppose the act was not a felony, and suppose the citizen acts on second hand information. Then a court may later say that informa-tion from a neighbor, employee, or from one's child was not correct. The arrest was without "reasonable cause". If so, the arrested person can sue and hold the citizen for damages for "false arrest". This can be costly. It is far better, if you can, to call a police officer.

When you attempt an acrest, you have to tell one person that he is under acrest Otherwise, he can lawfully resist You ma, use enough, but no more force than necessury to hold and turn the person over to the police If you use excessive force, the counts can make you pay for injuries you caused If the "excessive force" result, in death, one can be held for homicide. So don't get too

The law encourages private citizens to report crimes to the police rather than to take the physical and legal cisks of raking arrests thems lives. In reporting such crimes the citizen has no cital liability if it turns out that he was mistaken, so long as he acted in good faith.
