Cornell Develops Low-Cost Process For Egg Breakers

The development of a low-cost, pasteurization process for egg breakers has been reported by a Cornell University researcher.

A. J. Maurer, a graduate student in the poultry science department of N. Y. State College of Agriculture at Cornell, said the process involves pasteurizing liquid whole eggs in a batch of 50, 100 or 200 gallons.

Maurer discussed the development in a report to an recent annual meeting of the Poultry Science Association at the University of New Hampshire.

He said the process, called "batch type pasteurization," is an expensive and practical as compared to the widely used commercial process known as plate pasteurization.

Using his method Maurer destroyed the most heat-resistant Salmonella organism by heating the egg product to a temperature of 149 degrees F. for 25.5 minutes. The time involving the entire process includes the heating and cooling periods.

The Cornell student built an experimental pasteurizer in developing the new process for adoption by small egg breakers.

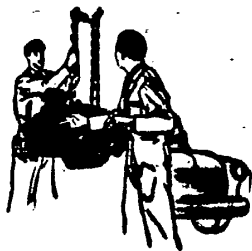
The bride, a graduate of West Hill High School, is a student at Syracuse University, where she is
