This year at A.C.S., we have the pleasure of having an exchange teacher, Miss Betty Wilmot Davies of Paignton, England Miss Davies is teaching in the place of Mr. William MacCrea, who is presently at Torquay as an exchange teacher. Both teachers are cooperating through the Committee for the Exchange of Teachers between Great Britain and the United States. This year there are about eighty-five exchanges.

Miss Davies taught at the Audley Parks County Secondary School in Torquay. She is the Art Mistress there, but this year Mr MacCrea is teaching in her place. There are about twelve hundred and fifty boys and girls between the ages of eleven and sixteen attending the Audley Parks Schools. She feels that the greatest difference between ACS and her school in England is the blocks of class time. In England she would have one particular class for a full morning or afternoon once a week. At ACS she has a class for a short period of time daily.

Miss Davies, who has been teaching for nineteen years, spent two years at Dartington Hall in Devonshire, two years at St. Katharine's College in London and one year at Cardiff College of Education in Cardiff, while earning her diploma
